



My dear beloved parishioners of Holy Trinity,

It is amazing how quickly time moves! It seems like yesterday, when in December, I offered my first monthly bulletin message to you, and we are already in March! I am pleased to say though, that these past three months that I have been with you, was a time filled with blessings and accomplishments. During the Christmas holidays – one of the busiest times of the year – I have had the pleasure of meeting many of you and your families; a wonderful process that continues to this day. I have to say that Holy Trinity is a well-organized Parish, with wonderful people, with a bright past and a most promising future!

Speaking of "future", the best part of it is our youth. We have a strong group of children, teenagers and young adults that stay close to our Orthodox Faith and love this Church with all their heart. This is evident in everything we do here at Holy Trinity; every day there is something going on for our youth, whether it is basketball practice, dance practice, JOY & HOPE family nights, GOYA meetings, Young Adult League gatherings, Greek School classes etc. However, the culmination of every youth activity is the participation of our children of all ages in the Sunday Divine Liturgy and the classes that follow. I am very proud of them, and I thank the parents for making the effort to bring our children to our church's many activities and for entrusting them to Jesus Christ, His Church and us.

On the weekend of February 17 & 18, 2024, we had our annual Basketball Tournament hosting nine Churches and their teams here at Holy Trinity. This was a huge undertaking resulting in a beautifully organized event that all thoroughly enjoyed. I would like to thank our GOYA Advisors and Coaches, together with the countless volunteers, who put their time and effort into making this year's Tournament a success. On that Sunday, we had the blessing of welcoming our Spiritual Father, His Eminence Metropolitan Apostolos of New Jersey, who celebrated the Divine Liturgy and offered his blessing to all. His Eminence's presence marked the beginning of our Parish's official celebration of our 90th Anniversary! His Eminence was amazed by the presence of so many young people in Church and was very thankful for the great participation of our youth in the Divine Liturgy. Moreover, we were all very excited and proud when our Holy Trinity Girls Basketball Team won the Tournament on that Sunday! Congratulations girls!

On a different note, this month we are entering Great Lent. This is the most sacred time of the ecclesiastical year and in the liturgical life of our Church. Great Lent is the appropriate time and opportunity to take a break from our hectic schedules and busy lives and look into our spiritual life and health. Our Holy Mother Church will be calling us all throughout this fasting season, to change our "lifestyles", not by simply going "vegan" but by restricting our bodily passions. And our passions can only be controlled and reduced by doing two things: fasting and praying. Only through fasting and praying can we deepen our relationship with God.

On "Forgiveness" Sunday, March 17, we will be asked by our Church to offer our forgiveness to everyone, even to our enemies, to begin the "good fight" of Lent. On "Clean Monday", March 18, which is the first day of Great Lent, the fast begins in earnest, with strict guidelines for fasting and prayer. On that day, we have the first Great Compline Service in the evening (*see analytical Lenten Liturgical Schedule below*), followed by an Orthodox Lecture-Discussion, where we will have the opportunity to learn more about Lent and other topics that concern our spiritual lives.

Every Wednesday evening, beginning March 20th, we will be celebrating the Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts, a very special and unique liturgical service. The Presanctified Liturgy is a solemn Lenten Vespers Service with the administration of Holy Communion added to it. This gives us the chance to receive the most precious Body and Blood of Christ in the middle of the week, allowing us to obtain strength and blessing to continue our spiritual fight and struggle. The evening Liturgy will be followed by a community meal.

Every Friday of Lent, for five Fridays, we will be celebrating the Salutations to the Theotokos. This joyful and beautiful Service, organically connected with the Feast of the Annunciation, is dedicated to the Virgin Mary, and helps us advance and progress in our spiritual life by coming closer to Her and entrusting ourselves to the Mother of God, Panagia.

On the Saturdays of the 9th, the 16th and the 23rd of March we remember our deceased (Saturday of the Souls). We will be offering memorial prayers at the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy, and our faithful are asked to bring the names of their deceased and kollyva (boiled wheat) as per our tradition, to be commemorated in the Service.

We can realize from the above that we are entering a unique season, filled with blessings and spiritual opportunities, but also with a lot of work to do! Let us try more this Great Lent. Let us increase our efforts to fast, repent, forgive and serve our brothers and sisters. Let us make every effort to come as much as we can to the sacred services of our Church, enjoy the beauty of the sacred services allowing them to lead us to our spiritual regeneration.

I pray that you all have a blessed and fruitful Great Lent, filled with the Grace of God.

Αγαπητοί μου Ενορίτες,

Ήδη βοισκόμαστε στον μήνα Μάοτιο, ο οποίος μας εισάγει στην Αγία και Μεγάλη Τεσσαρακοστή. Αντιλαμβανόμαστε πόσο γρήγορα κυλά ο χρόνος, σχεδόν αμείλικτα. Μου φαίνεται σαν χθες, όταν ήλθα στην Αγία Τριάδα πριν από τρεις μήνες. Από τότε, είχα την ευκαιρία να σας γνωρίσω, να κάνω φιλίες και να γίνω μέρος της καθημερινότητάς σας. Πραγματικά νιώθω ευλογημένος για όλα αυτά και συνεχίζω με πιο πολύ όρεξη και ένταση το έργο που μου έχει αναθέσει η Εκκλησία, δηλαδή να σας διακονώ.

Το μεγαλύτερο στολίδι της Ενορίας μας είναι η νεολαία μας. Τα νέα παιδιά που πλημμυρίζουν τους χώρους της Εκκλησίας μας και γεμίζουν με ζωντάνια τα πάντα! Αυτά τα παιδιά του Θεού, τα δικά σας παιδιά, που είναι και δικά μας, νιώθουν την Εκκλησία να είναι το σπίτι τους. Χαίρομαι που εμπιστεύεστε τα παιδιά σας στην Εκκλησία, ιδιαίτερα αυτούς τους δύσκολους καιρούς, όπου η κοινωνία θέλει να τα διδάξει καινούρια, άγνωστα, περίεργα πράγματα. Η μόνη προστασία τους από κάθε είδους κακές επιρροές και βλαβερές συνήθειες είναι η Εκκλησία του Χριστού.

Το Σαββατοκύριακο 17 και 18 Φεβρουαρίου είχαμε το καθιερωμένο τουρνουά μπάσκετ, και φιλοξενήσαμε νέους και νέες από 9 Ενορίες. Με τη Χάρη του Θεού, όλα πήγαν υπέροχα. Την διαφορά όμως έκαναν οι νέοι της Αγίας Τριάδας. Με πολύ αγάπη και καλοσύνη υποδέχθηκαν τα άλλα παιδιά και τις οικογένειές τους και βοήθησαν στην όλη διοργάνωση με άψογο τρόπο. Πραγματικά καμάρωσα τα παιδιά μας και ένιωσα υπερήφανος γι'αυτά. Ιδιαίτερα την Κυριακή εκείνη, όπου είχαμε την τιμή και ευλογία να υποδεχθούμε τον Πνευματικό μας Πατέρα, τον Σεβασμιώτατο Μητροπολίτη Νέας Ιερσέης κ. Απόστολο, ο οποίος επισκέφθηκε την Ενορία μας για πρώτη φορά μετά την Ενθρόνισή του. Ο Σεβασμιώτατος με την παρουσία του κήρυξε την έναρξη των επίσημων εορτασμών για τα 90 χρόνια της Ενορίας μας, αλλά κυρίως ευχαριστήθηκε με την μεγάλη παρουσία των παιδιών μας. Να τα ευλογεί ο Θεός!

Να πούμε όμως και λίγα λόγια για τις μεγάλες και σπουδαίες ημέφες που έφχονται. Στις 18 Μαφτίου ξεκινά η Μεγάλη Τεσσαφακοστή. Είναι μια πνευματική πεφίοδος όπου η Εκκλησία μας πφοσκαλεί να πφοετοιμαστούμε για το Πάθος και την Ανάσταση του Κυφίου μας. Αυτή η πφοετοιμασία πεφιλαμβάνει νηστεία, εγκφάτεια παθών, συγχώφηση, μετάνοια, εξομολόγηση, ελεημοσύνη και πφοσευχή. Είναι δηλαδή ένα πνευματικό στάδιο αφετών, στο οποίο καλούμαστε να αγωνιστούμε ώστε να νικήσουμε τον ίδιο μας τον (κακό) εαυτό...

Κύριο χαρακτηριστικό της Μεγάλης Τεσσαρακοστής είναι, όπως είπαμε, η νηστεία και η προσευχή. Η νηστεία δεν έχει σκοπό να μας εξουθενώσει αλλά ούτε και να μας αδυνατίσει. Σκοπό έχει να μας μάθει την ευλογημένη «εγκράτεια». Χαρακτηριστικά αναφέρει ο μακαριστός Μητροπολίτης Διοκλείας Κάλλιστος: «είναι σημαντικό να μην παραβλέπουμε τις σωματικές απαιτήσεις της νηστείας αλλά είναι ακόμα πιο σημαντικό να μην παραβλέπουμε την πνευματική της σημασία. Η νηστεία δεν είναι μόνο ζήτημα δίαιτας. Είναι ηθικό όπως και σωματικό. Η πραγματική νηστεία πρέπει να μεταστραφεί στην καρδιά και στη θέληση. Πρέπει να επιστρέφει στο Θεό, πρέπει να γυρίσει σαν τον Άσωτο στο σπίτι του Πατέρα μας. Με τα λόγια του Αγίου Ιωάννη του Χρυσοστόμου «εγκράτεια σημαίνει όχι μόνο από τα φαγητά αλλά και από τις αμαρτίες». «Η νηστεία», επιμένει, «έπρεπε να τηρείται όχι μόνον από το στόμα αλλά και από τα μάτια, τα αυτιά, τα πόδια, τα χέρια και όλα τα μέλη του σώματος»: το μάτι πρέπει να απέχει από αισχρά θεάματα, το αυτί από κακεντρεχή φλυαρία, τα χέρια από πράξεις αδικίας.» ("Νηστεία σημαίνει Εγκράτεια, Προσευχή, Αγαθοεργία", Σοφία και Λόγος, Φεβρ. 2015)

Όσο για την προσευχή, τώρα είναι η ευκαιρία να την αγαπήσουμε περισσότερο. Η περίοδος αυτή μας δίνει τη δυνατότητα όπως είπαμε να έλθουμε πιο κοντά στον Θεό διά της προσευχής. Προσευχή είναι η επικοινωνία μας με τον Πατέρα μας. Όπως γράφει και πάλι ο μακαριστός Μητροπολίτης Διοκλείας Κάλλιστος: «Ο ορθόδοξος συγγραφέας Τίτο Κόλλιαντερ γράφει: «έχουμε δημιουργηθεί για την προσευχή, όπως ακριβώς δημιουργηθήκαμε για να μιλάμε και να σκεφτόμαστε». Η προσευχή είναι η αληθινή μας φύση. Χωρίς προσευχή δεν είμαστε πραγματικά άνθρωποι. Αυτός είναι ο λόγος που ο απόστολος Παύλος έλεγε «ἀδιαλείπτως προσεύχεσθε» (Α΄ Θεσ. 5:17). Με την προτροπή αυτή δεν εννοούσε ότι θα πρέπει να λέμε προσευχές όλη την ώρα, καθώς κάτι τέτοιο είναι στην πραγματικότητα αδύνατο. Κάποιες στιγμές χρειάζεται να στρέψουμε την προσοχή μας και σε άλλα πράγματα. Αλλά είχε κατά νου την προσευχή ως έναν εννοούμενο προσανατολισμό, μία κρυμμένη διάσταση ή ένα ιδανικό, που διαπερνά όλα όσα κάνουμε. Όπως παρατηρεί ο άγιος Ισαάκ ο Σύρος, οι άγιοι ακόμη και όταν κοιμούνται δεν παύουν να προσεύχονται, γιατί το Άγιο Πνεύμα προσεύχεται πάντοτε μαζί τους. Αυτό, όντως, είναι εκείνο που πραγματικά χρειάζεται ο κόσμος: όχι απλά ανθρώπους που λένε πότε πότε προσευχές, αλλά ανθρώπους που είναι οι ίδιοι μια διαρκής προσευχή, ζωντανές φλόγες προσευχής. Τέτοιοι άνθρωποι μεταμορφώνουν τον κόσμο. Όπως έλεγε κι ο άγιος Ιωάννης της Κρονστάνδης, «Η προσευχή είναι μία κατάσταση συνεχούς ευγνωμοσύνης». (Public Orthodoxy, Μητροπολίτου Κάλλιστου Γουέαρ, 2020)

Αυτές τις άγιες ημέσες της Μεγάλης Τεσσαρακοστής η Εκκλησία μας θα μας δώσει πολλές πνευματικές ευκαιρίες μέσα από τις ιερές Ακολουθίες. Την Καθαρά Δευτέρα, 18 Μαρτίου, και κάθε Δευτέρα, θα τελούμε το Μεγάλο Απόδειπνο στις 6 το απόγευμα και θα ακολουθεί πνευματική ομιλία. Από την Τετάρτη 20 Μαρτίου και κάθε Τετάρτη στις 6.30 το απόγευμα θα τελούμε την όμορφη και κατανυκτική Λειτουργία των Προηγιασμένων Δώρων και θα ακολουθεί νηστίσιμο γεύμα. Από την Παρασκευή 22 Μαρτίου και κάθε Παρασκευή θα τελούμε τους Χαιρετισμούς της Παναγίας μας στις 6.30 το απόγευμα. Τα Σάββατα 9, 16 και 23 Μαρτίου έχουμε τα Ψυχοσάββατα, όπου τελούμε μνημόσυνα και θυμόμαστε τους αγαπημένους μας που είναι στον ουρανό. Και φυσικά κάθε Κυριακή συμμετέχουμε στην Θεία Λειτουργία.

Είμαστε ευλογημένοι αγαπητοί μου που έχουμε την Αγία μας Μητέφα, την Εκκλησία, η οποία μας αγαπά και ενδιαφέφεται για την πνευματική μας πφοκοπή και καλλιέφγεια. Ας μην χάσουμε λοιπόν την ευκαιφία και τα δώφα που μας δίνει ο Θεός αυτή την πεφίοδο της Σαφακοστής. Ας πφοσπαθήσουμε να ζήσουμε -ο καθένας σύμφωνα με τις δυνάμεις του- την πνευματικότητα που μας χαφίζει η Σαφακοστή, με την ευλογημένη νηστεία, την αγάπη στο συνάνθφωπο και την συμμετοχή μας στις ιεφές Ακολουθίες. Μόνο έτσι θα καταλάβουμε καλύτεφα και θα νιώσουμε έτοιμοι να υποδεχθούμε το Πάσχα, ένα αληθινό και διαφοφετικό Πάσχα από κάθε άλλη χφονιά.

Καλή και ευλογημένη Μεγάλη Τεσσαρακοστή αγαπητοί μου!

The Saturday of Souls

Through the Apostolic Constitutions (Book VIII, ch. 42), the Church of Christ has received the custom to make commemorations for the departed on the third, ninth, and fortieth days after their repose. Since many throughout the ages, because of an untimely death in a faraway place, or other adverse circumstances, have died without being deemed worthy of the appointed memorial services, the divine Fathers, being so moved in their love for man, have decreed that a common memorial be made this day for all pious Orthodox Christians who have reposed from all ages past, so that those who did not have particular memorial services may be included in this common one for all. Also, the Church of Christ teaches us that alms should be given to the poor by the departed one's kinsmen as a memorial for him.

Besides this, since we make commemoration tomorrow of the Second Coming of Christ, and since the reposed have neither been judged, nor have received their complete recompense (Acts 17:31; II Peter 2:9; Heb. 11:39-40), the Church rightly commemorates the souls today, and trusting in the boundless mercy of God, she prays Him to have mercy on sinners. Furthermore, since the commemoration is for all the reposed together, it reminds each of us of his own death, and arouses us to repentance.

Lenten Words of Wisdom

A life of fasting, properly understood as general self-limitation and abstinence, to the annual practice of which the Church always calls us with the Great Lent, is really that bearing of the cross and self-crucifixion which is required of us by our calling as Christians. And anyone who stubbornly resists this, wanting to live a carefree, happy, and free life, is concerned for sensual pleasures and avoids sorrow and suffering that person is not a Christian. Bearing one's cross is the natural way of every true Christian, without which there is no Christianity.

Archbishop Averky of Syracuse (of Blessed Memory)

Abba Isidore said, "If you fast regularly, do not be inflated with pride; if you think highly of yourself because of it, then you had better eat meat. It is better for a man to eat meat than to be inflated with pride and glorify himself." The Desert Fathers




An old man was asked, 'How can I find God?' He said, 'In fasting, in watching, in labors, in devotion, and, above all, in discernment. I tell you, many have injured their bodies without discernment and have gone away from us having achieved nothing. Our mouths smell bad through fasting, we know the Scriptures by heart, we recite all the Psalms of David, but we have not that which God seeks: charity and humility.' The Desert Fathers

Beware of limiting the good of fasting to mere abstinence from meats. Real fasting is alienation from evil. Loose the bands of wickedness.' Forgive your neighbor the mischief he has done you. Forgive him his trespasses against you. Do not 'fast for strife and debate.' You do not devour flesh, but you devour your brother. You abstain from wine, but you indulge in outrages. You wait for evening before you take food, but you spend the day in the law courts. Woe to those who are 'drunken, but not with wine.' Anger is the intoxication of the soul, and makes it out of its wits like wine. St. Basil, in his homilies on the Holy Spirit

Eat simply, and stop before satiety. What do I mean by this? First eating simply means that one's food preparation should not be of the normal, non-fasting type: sumptuous, fattened, and designed to entice the palate. This only reinforces one's love for food. This does not mean that one's preparation should result in food that is repugnant. Rather it means that it should not inflame one's desire for more, nor incite one (e.g. overly spicy or rich tasting recipes). It should be such that it is simple, meager, and life-sustaining. It is still permissible for the food to be interesting and pleasant to eat (after all it is not a sin to enjoy food in moderation)." Anonymous letter to a new convert,





Annunciation of the Theotokos / March 25

Reading:

Six months after John the Forerunner's conception, the Archangel Gabriel was sent by God to Nazareth, a town of Galilee, unto Mary the Virgin, who had come forth from the Temple a mature maiden (see Nov. 21). According to the tradition handed down by the Fathers, she had been betrothed to Joseph four months. On coming to Joseph's house, the Archangel declared: "Rejoice, thou Full of Grace, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women." After some consideration, and turmoil of soul, and fear because of this greeting, the Virgin, when she had finally obtained full assurance concerning God's condescension ineffable unsearchable and the dispensation that was to take place through her, and believing that all things are possible to the Most High,

answered in humility: "Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy word." And at this, the Holy Spirit came upon her, and the power of the Most high overshadowed her all-blameless womb, and the Son and Word of God, Who existed before the ages, was conceived past speech and understanding, and became flesh in her immaculate body (Luke 1:26-38).

Bearing in her womb the Uncontainable One, the blessed Virgin went with haste from Nazareth to the hill country of Judea, where Zacharias had his dwelling; for she desired to find Elizabeth her kinswoman and rejoice together with her, because, as she had learned from the Archangel, Elizabeth had conceived in her old age. Furthermore, she wished to tell her of the great things that the Mighty One had been well-pleased to bring to pass in her, and she greeted Elizabeth and drew nigh to her. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, she felt her six-month-old babe, Saint John the Baptist, prophesied of the dawning of the spiritual Sun. Immediately, the aged Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and recognized her as the Mother of her Lord, and with a great voice blessed her and the Fruit that she held within herself. The Virgin also, moved by a supernatural rejoicing in the spirit, glorified her God and Savior, saying: "My soul doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Saviour," and the rest, as the divine Luke hath recorded (1:39-55)

Apolytikion in the Fourth Tone

Today marks the crowning of our salvation and the revelation of the mystery before all ages. For the Son of God becomes the son of the Virgin, and Gabriel proclaims the grace. Wherefore, we also cry out with him, "Hail, O full of grace, the Lord is with you."

Kontakion in the Plagal of the Fourth Tone

To you, Theotokos, invincible Defender, having been delivered from peril, I, your city, dedicate the victory festival as a thank offering. In your irresistible might, keep me safe from all trials, that I may call out to you: "Hail, unwedded bride!"

MARCH 25TH, THE ANNUNCIATION OF THE THEOTOKOS

Of all the solemn days in Orthodoxy the day of March 25 is one not only of religious significance but of political significance as well, allowing the Greek Orthodox to commemorate God's message to Mary and the independence of Greece on the same day.

The expression, "For God and Country," has real meaning for the Greek Orthodox on the 25th day of March, a day on which he can celebrate two events without diminishing either one for the obvious reason that devotion and patriotism have the same emotional root — love. If Christianity could be compressed into a single word, that word would be love. The same holds true for patriotism.

Uppermost in the true Greek's mind on March 25, however, is Mary, chosen from all the women in the world to be the Mother of Jesus Christ. When the angel Gabriel brought the momentous message from God this day, the gentle Mary must have felt a solemn pride, but at the same time a disquieting apprehension at the prospect of this awesome responsibility. Assured by the Archangel, Mary's answer was a simple: "Let it be according to the will of God," and the rest is glorious history.

The world of Mary of two thousand years ago is envisioned as one in which life was simple and free of the complexities that plague the modern world, but in that age of self-sufficiency there were problems which would be insurmountable today. The mother of that day was all things to her family, and it can safely be said that when the Archangel Gabriel departed, the prospective Mother of God must have for several moments felt terribly alone, Everyone knows about the nativity and the mission of Jesus Christ, but the details of the days, months and years in between are known but to Mary and to God.

The political importance of March 25 is fully realized only when the suffering of four centuries is called to mind. In 1458 the Ottoman hordes overran all of Greece and most of the Balkans and held hostage a people whose culture dated back more than two thousand years, and who gave more to the world than it could ever receive in return, and it seems that the world just stood by while the cradle of democracy and Christianity was being defiled by a scourge that would have undone a less hardy breed.


Hopelessly outnumbered, Greece endured nearly four hundred years of brutal oppression, but the spirit of its people knew not a single moment's weakness. The fires of rebellion that the Turks thought they had snuffed out, but which had smoldered in Hellenic hearts for almost 400 years, were kindled into a conflagration on March

25th, 1821, not by a bemedalled general but by a man of the cloth, Bishop Germanos of Patras, Greece, who chose the day of the Annunciation knowing God would be on the side of the Greeks.

The good bishop held the Cross of Jesus Christ aloft on the 25th day of March 1821, and proclaimed freedom for all Greek Orthodox Christians. It was a motion seconded by every Greek in the country. In addition to engaging in a war for independence, the Greeks were actually waging a holy war because it was not only Greek against Turk but Christian against Muslim, and the subsequent Greek victory was a triumph of Christianity.


Dr. Soumakis holds a PhD in History and Education from Teachers College,

202nd l Anniversary of the 25th of March, 1821 Greek Independence Day

The struggle of the enslaved Greeks against their ruthless rulers, the Ottoman Turks, officially started on the 25th of March 1821 in the monastery of Hagia Lavra, Kalavryta. Germanos, the bishop of Paleon Patron, raised the banner of the revolution and blessed the arms of the captains of the revolting Greeks. The beginning of the revolution coincided with one of the holiest days for Orthodox Christians, the Annunciation of the Theotokos. Unofficially though, the revolution of the Hellenes against the Ottoman Turks started one day after the fall of Constantinople on the 29th of May 1453, and continues until today. However, about 20 actual unsuccessful uprisings took place before the 1821 revolution that managed to liberate about 25% of the Hellenes residing in the Ottoman empire.

The culturally superior Hellenic world, as represented by the Eastern Roman Empire, also known as Byzantine Empire, in 1453, fell to the nomadic Asian Turk, and further failed to civilize and assimilate this new conqueror as it had previously done with the Romans. The Moslem Turk adopted the material part of the Byzantines but not its Hellenic intellectual and cultural heritage. Under penalty of death, no Turk could be Christianized but many Christians, for their survival, converted to Islam. Thus, the probability that many of today's Turks are descended from the Greeks is high.

During the 400 years of Ottoman occupation

- complete lack of schooling resulted in illiterate, superstitious and ignorant Hellenes (especially in their culture, history and language). Interestingly, the same Turkish policy continues today with the Kurds!
- systematic abduction of Christian children forming the infamous and cruel Jenisaries, faithful only to Sultan
- moderate religious freedom was granted to those minorities who accepted the Sultan as their despotic leader and paid their taxes
- churches were turned into mosques and icons were destroyed (usually by poking out the eyes of the depicted saints, as it is happening in the conquered north part of Cyprus today, at the end of the 20th century).

However, the Hellenes living in the occupied Hellas reacted to the oppression, lack of education and freedom by

- continuous uprisings against their Ottoman overlords (kleftes and armatoloi were a continuous headache for the Turks)
- obtaining elementary education in the Hidden Schools (for reading and writing only), formed and covertly operated by the church (at the same time the Europeans, through the discovery of Hellenic classics, began the renaissance, after many centuries of darkness)
- always being reminded of their glorious past and the contribution of their ancestors to the world by the surrounding ruins of ancient temples, theaters and

- stadia; thus keeping their historical identity alive
- becoming successful international ship owners and merchants (Turks were not very successful as sea merchants, thus bringing the European ideas of democracy and freedom back to the enslaved Hellenes and at the same time informing the Europeans of their struggle (AGON) for independence and human dignitythe contributions of the fleet of Spetses, Hydra and Chios were of extreme importance to the success of the revolution.

The struggle of the Hellenes for independence was coordinated from abroad. The Hellenes of Diaspora were the strategic and financial brains behind the revolution (Secret Society of Friends [Filiki Etaeria], Sacred Band [Ieros Lohos], Ypsilandis, Koraes, Kapodistrias and many others raised the interest of the European and American intellectuals and Phil-Hellenes (Lord Byron, Dr. Samuel Gridly Howe, and Daniel Webster to name a few)

The Hellenes of mainland Hellas formed military groups and carried out most of the burden of the fighting against the Ottoman Turks in Hellas; Kolokotronis, Karaiskakis, Papaflessas, Androutsos, Botsaris, Bouboulina, and Miaoulis were some of the heroes and military leaders suffered most of the consequences of their revolution against the Turks (burning of Chios and Psara) proved to the enslaved peoples of the Balkans (Aemos peninsula) that the Ottoman army was not invincible through their determination and self-sacrifice (Souli, Alamana, Messologi, Maniaki) they achieved significant victories over the Turks, thus liberating within 2 years Attica, Peloponnese and Sterea Ellas, which comprised in 1823 the first free Hellenic State forced the allied victory at the battle of Navarino, 1828, thus accelerating the demise of the Ottoman Empire.

The Holy Alliance, comprised of Austria, Russia, England, France, and Germany, tried to put an end to the revolution. The revolting Hellenes had been characterized, mainly by the Austrians, as agitators or terrorists using today's language. However, their fight for independence inspired many Europeans Phil-Hellenes, who gave their life for their righteous struggle. It is worth mentioning that there were Phil-Hellenes from every European nation except Austria and Czarist Russia (however, the *Ieros Lohos (Sacred Band*) was formed in Russia).

The struggle of the Hellenes for Independence eventually resulted in the demise of the Ottoman Empire and the liberation of the enslaved **Balkans** (**Haemus Peninsula**) from the Ottoman yoke--it is also worth mentioning that the only people in the Balkans who fought against the Ottoman Turks were the Hellenes, something never forgotten by the contemporary Turks, and the creation of the contemporary Hellas State, an oasis of peace, democracy and stability, not only in the Balkans but in the Eastern Mediterranean as well. *Even today, Turkey considers Hellas as "A land under temporary Greek occupation"!*

LONG LIVE THE 25TH OF MARCH 1821!!!

Ο αγώνας των σκλαβωμένων Ελλήνων εναντίον των σκληρών και ανελέητων Οθωμανών Τούρκων, άρχισε επίσημα την 25η Μαρίου στήν Μονή της Αγίας Λαύρας στα Καλάβρυτα. Ο επίσκοπος Παλαιών Πατρών Γερμανός ύψωσε το λάβαρο της επαναστάσεως και ευλόγησε τα όπλα των καπεταναίων των επαναστατημένων Ελλήνων. Η έναρξη της επαναστάσεως συνέπεσε με τον Ευαγγελισμό της Θεοτόκου, μία από τις ιερώτερες ημέρες της Ορθοδοχίας. Όμως η επανάσταση των Ελλήνων ή ο ξεσηκωμός του Γένους, όπως αλλοιώς είναι γνωστή, είχε αρχίσει την επόμενη ημέρα από της πτώσεως της Κωνσταντινουπόλεως, 29 Μαϊου 1453, και συνεχίζεται μέχρι τις ημέρες μας. Συγκεκριμμένα περίπου 20 αποτυχημένες προσπάθειες προηγήθηκαν της επαναστάσεως της 25^η Μαρίου του 1821. Μέσα στα επόμενα 7 χρόνια το 25% των σκλαβωμένων Ελλήνων είχε απελευθερωθεί.

Η πτώση της Κωνσταντινουπόλεως το 1453 εσήμανε το τέλος της Ανατολικής Ρωμαϊκής Αυτοκρατορίας, γνωστή ως Βυζαντινή Αυτοκρατορία, και την αντικατάστασή της υπό της βαρβάρου και απολιτίστου Οθωμανικής αυτοκρατορίας. Πολλοί Χριστιανοί για να σώσουν το κεφάλι τους και να προστατέουν της οικογένειες τους εξισλαμίσθηκαν (όπως συνέβη με τους Μουσουλμάνους της Βοσνίας).

Κατά την διάρκεια των 400 χρόνων Οθωμανικής κατοχής

- η παντελής έλλειψις εκπαιδεύσεως εδημιούργησε
 Έλληνες προληπτικούς και αμόρφωτους, επιλήσμονες
 της γλώσσας των και της ιστορίας των. Η ίδια πολιτική εφαρμόζεται σήμερα στους Κούρδους!
- συστηματική απαγωγή των αρσενικών παιδιών των Χριστιανικών πληθυσμών (παιδομάζωμα), τα οποία εχρησιμοποιήθηκαν δια τον σχηματισμό των απανθρώπων Γενιτσάρων, πιστών μόνο στον Σουλτάνο
- <u>περιορισμένη θρησκευτική ελευθερία</u> είχε δοθεί μόνο στις μειονότητες που είχαν αποδεχθεί τον Σουλτάνο σαν αρχηγό τους και επλήρωναν τους φόρος τους
- εκκλησίες μετετράπηκαν σε μουσουλμανικά τεμένη (τζαμιά) και εικόνες κατεστρέφοντο (συνήθως τους αφαιρούντο τα μάτια, όπως συμβαίνει εξ' άλλου και σήμερα στο κατεχόμενο, τμήμα της Κύπρου)

Η αντίσταση των σκλαβωμένων Ελλήνων στην καταπίεση, έλλειψη εκπαιδεύσεως και ελευθερίας χαρακτηρίζεται

- <u>από τις συνεχείς εξεγέρσεις</u> εναντίον των Τούρκων (Κλέφτες και οι Αρματωλοί)
- από την μάθηση στοιχειώδους αναγνώσεως και γραφής στα Κρυφά Σχολεία (σε αντιδιαστολή οι υπόλοιποι Ευρωπαίοι δια μέσου της ανακαλύψεως των δημιουργημάτων των αρχαίων Ελλήνων είχαν αρχίσει την αναγέννησή τους μετα απο έναν πολύχρονο Μεσαίωνα)
- από την υπενθύμιση του ενδόξου παρελθόντος των και της συνεισφοράς των προγόνων των στον κόσμο μέσω των ερειπίων των αρχαίων ναών και θεάτρων.διατηρώντας έτσι την εθνική ταυτότητα τους ζωντανή
- απο την επιτυχία τους ως εφοπλιστών και εμπόρων (οικονομικοί τομείς όπου οι Τούρκοι δεν είχαν επιτύχει), μεταφέροντας κατ' αυτόν τον τρόπο στην Ελλάδα

- τις Ευρωπαϊκές ιδέες για δημοκρατία και ελευθερία και ταυτοχρόνως μεταφέροντας τον αγώνα των Ελλήνων για
- ανεξαρτησία και ανθρώπινη αξιοπρέπεια στους Ευρωπαίους—η συνεισφορά των εμπορικών στόλων των Σπετσών, Υδρας και Χίου ήταν αποφασιστικής σπουδαιότητας στην επιτυχή έκβαση της επαναστάσεως

Ο αγώνας των Ελλήνων για ανεξαρτησία συντονίζετο από το εξωτερικό. Οι Έλληνες της Διασποράς

- <u>ήταν οι στρατηγικοί σχεδιαστές και οικονομικοί παρά-</u>
 <u>γοντες</u> της επαναστάσεως (Φιλική Εταιρεία, Ιερός Λόχος, Υψηλάντης, Κοραής, Καποδίστριας και πολλοί άλλοι)
- προκάλεσαν το ενδιαφέρον των Ευρωπαίων και Αμερικανών Διανοουμένων και Φιλελλήνων (Λόρδος Βύρων, Δρ. Σαμουήλ Χάουη και Δανιήλ Γουέπστερ κ.α.)
- Οι σκλαβωμένοι Έλληνες της κυρίως Ελλάδος εσχημάτισαν επαναστατικά στρατιωτικά σώματα και εσήκωσαν το μεγαλύτερο βάρος της εξεγέρσεως εναντίον των Οθωμανών Τούρκων. Κολοκοτρώνης, Καραϊσκάκης, Παπφλέσσας, Ανδρούτσος, Μπότσαρης, Μπουμπουλίνα και Μιαούλης είναι ονόματα μερικών ηρώων και στρατιωτικών ηγετών του αγώνα
- υπέφεραν τις περισσότερες συνέπειες του αγώνα τους (καταστροφή των Ψαρών και της Χίου)
- απέδειξαν στούς σκλαβωμένους κατοίκους της Χερσόνησου του Αίμου (Βαλκάνια) ότι ο πολυάριθμος Οθωμανικός στρατός δεν ήταν ανίκητος
- κατέφεραν με την αυτοθυσία τους και τον ηρωϊσμό τους (Σούλι, Μανιάκι, Αλαμάνα, Μεσολόγγι) σημαντικές νίκες κατα των Τούρκων, απελευθερώνοντας έτσι μέσα σε 2 χρόνια την Αττική, Πελοπόνησσο και Στερεά Ελλάδα, τα οποία απετέλεσαν το 1823 το πρώτο ελεύθερο Ελληνικό κράτος
- ανάγκασαν τους συμμάχους να νικήσουν τον Τουρκικό στόλο στο Ναβαρίνο το 1828, επιταχύνοντας έτσι την πτώση της Οθωμανικής αυτοκρατορίας. Οι Έλληνες είχαν χαρακτηρισθεί από τους Αυστριακούς ιδιαίτερα σαν επαναστάτες ή τρομοκράτες με τα σημερινά δεδομένα. Παρ' όλα ταύτα ο αγώνας τους ενέπνευσε πολλούς Φιλέλληνες, οι οποίοι έδωσαν την ζωή τους για τον δίκαιο αγώνα τους. Αξιοσημείωτο είναι ότι υπήρχαν Φιλέλληνες απ'όλη την Ευρώπη πλήν της Αυστρίας και της Τσαρικής Ρωσσίας

Ο αγώνας των Ελλήνων δια Ανεξαρτησία τελικώς επέφερε την πτώση της Οθωμανικής Αυτοκρατορίας

- τη απελευθέρωση των σκλαβωμένων Βαλκανίων (Χερσόνησος του Αίμου) απο τον Οθωμανικό ζυγό—Οι Έλληνες ήταν οι μόνοι που επολέμησαν τους Οθωμανούς Τούρκους στα Βαλκάνια, κάτι που οι Τούρκοι δεν ελησμόνησαν ποτέ, και
- την δημιουργία του συγχρόνου Ελληνικού Κράτους, το οποίο είναι μιά όασις ειρήνης, δημοκρατίας και σταθερότητος, όχι μόνο στα Βαλκάνια αλλά και στην ευρύτερη περιοχή της Ανατολικής Μεσογείου. Ακόμη και Σήμερα, η Τουρκία εξακολουθεί να θεωρεί την Ελλάδα ως «Εδάφη υπο προσωρινή Ελληνική κατοχή».





Μονή Αγίας Αικατερίνης τοῦ "Όρους Σινᾶ

Το Ελληνορθόδοξο μοναστήρι του θεοβάδιστου Όρους Σινά βρίσκεται ακριβώς στο σημείο όπου ο Θεός εμφανίστηκε στον Μωυσή στον Φλεγόμενο Θάμνο, κάτω από το Όρος του Δεκάλογου. Κατά την πρόνοια του Θεού, σε αυτόν τον χώρο είναι και τα ιερά λείψανα της Αγίας Αικατερίνης. Πρόκειται για το αρχαιότερο συνεχώς κατοικούμενο Χριστιανικό μοναστήρι, με ιστορία που μπορεί να ανιχνευθεί πάνω από δεκαεπτά αιώνες. Το μοναστήρι προϋπήρχε των διαιρέσεων του χριστιανικού κόσμου, οι απαρχές του εκτείνονται μέχρι την ύστερη αρχαιότητα.

Το μοναστήρι δεν καταστράφηκε ποτέ σε όλη του την ιστορία, και έτσι μπορεί να ειπωθεί ότι διατήρησε ανέπαφα τις χαρακτηριστικές ιδιότητες της ελληνικής και ρωμαϊκής κληρονομιάς του. Μέλη άλλων χριστιανικών ομολογιών έχουν τιμήσει το μοναστήρι, προσερχόμενοι ως προσκυνητές στον ιερό αυτό τόπο. Όμως από τις απαρχές του, οι χριστιανοί κάτοικοι του Σινά ανήκαν στον ελληνόφωνο κόσμο και μέχρι σήμερα.

Η παλαιότερη περιγραφή αναφέρεται στο Μοναστήρι της Παναγίας, γιατί η αποκάλυψη του Θεού στον Φλεγόμενο Θάμνο θεωρήθηκε ως ένας τύπος της Παναγίας και της Ενανθρωπήσεως. Το μοναστήρι είναι επίσης ιδιαίτερα αφιερωμένο στους αγίους προφήτες Μωυσή και Ηλία, που ήρθαν και οι δύο σε αυτό το βουνό, και που και οι δύο μίλησαν με τον Χριστό στη Μεταμόρφωση. Πιο πρόσφατα, ήταν γνωστό ως Μονή της Αγίας Αικατερίνης. Αυτό παραμένει το όνομά του σήμερα, αν και το μοναστήρι δεν έχει χάσει τα παλαιότερα αφιερώματα του.

Το μοναστήρι μπορεί να θεωρηθεί ως μια πραγματική Κιβωτός για τους πνευματικούς του θησαυρούς. Αυτά περιλαμβάνουν τα χειρόγραφα και τα πρώϊμα έντυπα βιβλία που σώζονται στη βιβλιοθήκη του Σινά, η οποία τιμάται σε όλο τον κόσμο για την αρχαιότητα και τη σημασία των τόμων της. Περιλαμβάνει επίσης τις μοναστηριακές εικόνες, οι οποίες περιλαμβάνουν τη σημαντικότερη συλλογή προεικονοκλαστικών εικόνων, και εικόνες με τη μεγαλύτερη ομορφιά και σημασία που χρονολογούνται από την εποχή της δυναστείας των Κομνηνών.

Το μοναστήρι τιμάται από άρχοντες σε όλη την ιστορία του. Σε αυτούς περιλαμβάνονται η αυτοκράτειρα Ελένη, ο αυτοκράτορας Ιουστινιανός, ο Μωάμεθ ο ιδρυτής του Ισλάμ, ο Σουλτάνος Σελίμ Α΄, η αυτοκράτειρα Αικατερίνη της Ρωσίας και ο Ναπολέων Βοναπάρτης. Οι σύγχρονοι αρχηγοί κρατών συνέχισαν να δείχνουν το ενδιαφέρον τους για το μοναστήρι. Η Ιερά Μονή Σινά γιορτάζεται σε όλο τον κόσμο για την πνευματική και πολιτιστική της ακτινοβολία. Έχει σεβαστεί όχι μόνο από τους Χριστιανούς, αλλά και από Μουσουλμάνους και Εβραίους. Έχει πρόσφατα καταχωρηθεί από την UNESCO ως Μνημείο Παγκόσμιας Κληρονομιάς, τόσο για την πολιτιστική όσο και για τη γραφική του σημασία.

Οι μοναχοί του Σινά, από τα πρώτα χρόνια μέχρι σήμερα, διατηρούν αφοσίωση τόσο στην προσευχή όσο και στην υποστήριξη προσκυνητών και επισκεπτών. Ζουν ειρηνικά με τον ιθαγενή Βεδουίνο. Διατηρούν την αρχαία πνευματική κληρονομιά του Σινά, μια κληρονομιά που εκτείνεται από τη παραλαβή του Νόμου, μέσφ ολόκληρης της Παλαιάς και της Καινής Διαθήκης, μέχρι το πλήθος των αγίων των οποίων η μνήμη έχει διαφυλαχτεί ευλαβικά στο Σινά – πάνω απ' όλα, μέχρι την Παναγία Θεοτόκο, στους προφήτες Μωϋσή και Ηλία και στην Αγία Αικατερίνη.

Saint Catherine Monastery, of Sinai Mount

The Greek Orthodox monastery of the God-trodden Mount Sinai is located at the very place where God appeared to Moses in the Burning Bush, beneath the Mount of the Decalogue. In the providence of God, it is at this site also that the holy relics of Saint Catherine are enshrined. This is the oldest continuously inhabited Christian monastery, with a history that can be traced back over seventeen centuries. The monastery predates the divisions of the Christian world, its origins extending to late antiquity.

The monastery has never been destroyed in all its history, and thus it can be said to have preserved intact the distinctive qualities of its Greek and Roman heritage. Members of other Christian confessions have honored the monastery, coming as pilgrims to this holy place. But from its beginnings, the Christian inhabitants of Sinai belonged to the Greek speaking world, and it has remained so to this day.

The earliest description refers to the Monastery of the Holy Virgin, for the revelation of God at the Burning Bush was seen as a type of the Virgin Mary and the Incarnation. The monastery is also especially dedicated to the holy prophets Moses and Elias, who both came to this mountain, and who both spoke with Christ at the Transfiguration. More recently, it has been known as Saint Catherine's Monastery. This remains its name today, though the monastery has not lost its earlier dedications.

The monastery can be thought of as a veritable Ark for its spiritual treasures. These include the manuscripts and early printed books preserved in the Sinai library, which is celebrated throughout the world for the antiquity and importance of its volumes. It also includes the monastery icons, which include the most important collection of pre-iconoclastic panel icons, and icons of the greatest beauty and significance dating from the time of the Comnene dynasty.

The monastery has been honored by rulers throughout its history. These include the Empress Helena, the Emperor Justinian, Mohammed the Founder of Islam, Sultan Selim I, the Empress Catherine of Russia, and Napoleon Bonaparte. Contemporary heads of state have continued to show their interest in the monastery. The Holy Monastery of Sinai has been celebrated throughout the world for its spiritual and cultural radiance. It has been revered not only by Christians, but also by Moslems and Jews. It has recently been listed by UNESCO as a World Heritage Site, both for its cultural and for its scenic significance.

The monks of Sinai, from earliest times until the present day, maintain a dedication both to prayer and to the support of pilgrims and visitors. They live at peace with the native Bedouin. They maintain the ancient spiritual heritage of Sinai, a heritage that extends from the giving of the Law, through the whole of the Old and New Testaments, to the multitude of saints whose memory has been enshrined at Sinai – above all, to the All-holy Theotokos, to the holy prophets Moses and Elias, and to Saint Catherine.
