


My beloved parishioners,

By the grace and mercy of God, we have entered this beautiful month of May,

and we are celebrating the Glorious Resurrection of Jesus Christ. May has brought us the regeneration and rebirth of nature and Christ's Resurrection is also bringing us hope, joy, and a real purpose in life!

As the above troparion that we sing on Holy Saturday night, proclaims: "now everything is filled with light"; this is the light that springs out of the empty tomb of Christ. This is the light that fills our lives and makes us "children of the Church who are illumined" (troparion of Pentecost). This is





As you can see, our Holy Mother Church is giving us the means and supplies to sustain our spiritual health with many opportunities to enhance our Christian life and fill them with Christ's light. Holy Week, with the many Services and the multiple lessons that it gives us, is a great example. We also have the many feasts of Saints that are in the month of May. Saint Irene the Martyr, Saint Ephraim the New-Martyr (May 5), Saint George, the trophy-bearer, (May 6), and Saint Christoforos of Lycia (May 9),

declared themselves to be Christians, and due to this confession of their faith they suffered greatly, ultimately sacrificing their lives for Jesus Christ. Saint Thomas the Apostle (May 12) preached the Gospel in Asia, suffered tortures and finally earned a martyr's death.

On Bright Friday (May 10) we celebrate Panagia as "The Life-Giving Spring" ($Z\omega$ οδόχος Πηγή, Zoodochos Pege), since she gave birth to Life, who is Christ, and she continuously intercedes for the salvation and the healing of everyone who turns to her. On May 21 we commemorate Saint Constantine the Great and his mother Helen, who are called Equal-to-the Apostles, because of their tremendous contribution to the establishment of the Christian faith to the known world.

My beloved, as we are celebrating Easter, we are also celebrating the true life which is Christ, and the unconditional and sacrificial love of Christ for every human being that comes into this world. Let us spread this love everywhere and thus adhere to Christ's words: "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another" (John 13:35). κτίσις, την Έγερσιν Χριστοῦ, ἐν ή ἐστερέωται» (Γ΄ Ωδή Πάσχα)

Αγαπητοί μου Ενορίτες,

Αυτά τα όμορφα και ιερά λόγια της Εκκλησίας μας μεταφέρουν το μήνυμα της Αναστάσεως του Κυρίου μας και την καινούρια πνευματική κατάσταση που ακολουθεί την Ανάσταση: το Φως. Ο ιερός υμνωδός μας διδάσκει ότι τώρα όλα έχουν γεμίσει με το Φως της Αναστάσεως. Όλα έχουν πλημμυρίσει με λάμψη Χριστού. Δεν υπάρχουν πια σκοτάδια. Ο Χριστός εξουδετέρωσε το σκοτάδι με την Ανάστασή Του. Ακόμα και τα καταχθόνια, δηλαδή το βασίλειο του θανάτου, φωτίστηκε από την Έγερση του Χριστού. Γιαυτό ο υμνωδός μας παροτρύνει να εορτάσουμε με χαρά όλοι μας, ολόκληρη η κτίση, αυτή τη νίκη του Χριστού εναντίον του θανάτου και του διαβόλου.

Εφόσον όμως η Ανάσταση του Χριστού είναι «Φως» έτσι και εμείς οφείλουμε να είμαστε φωτεινοί άνθρωποι. Όλοι μας έχουμε τα δικά μας σκοτάδια, που είναι κρυμμένα στην καρδιά και το μυαλό μας και δεν μας αφήνουν να προχωρήσουμε σωστά στην πνευματική ζωή. Σαν σωστοί Χριστιανοί όμως, και καθώς εορτάζουμε συνειδητά την Ανάσταση του Κυρίου μας, πρέπει να ανοίξουμε την καρδιά και το μυαλό μας στην Χάρη του Θεού και να αφήσουμε το Φως της Αναστάσεως να εισέλθει και να γεμίσει την ύπαρξή μας και ολόκληρο τον εαυτό μας. Για να δώσσουμε όμως όλο μας το «είναι» στον Χριστό, πρέπει πρώτα να Τον πιστέψουμε βαθιά, με όλη τη δύναμη της ψυχής μας, και να Τον κάνουμε πρότυπο στη ζωή μας. Να πιστέψουμε στην Ανάστασή Του ως προοίμιο και προάγγελο της δικής μας αναστάσεως. Μόνο τότε θα μπορέσουμε να σηκώσουμε το βάρος και τις δυσκολίες αυτής της ζωής και να ελπίζουμε στην Βασιλεία του Θεού.

Το «Φως» του Χοιστού για το οποίο μιλήσαμε μέχοι τώρα, που είναι και το Φως της Αναστάσεως, δεν μπορεί να λάμψει στις ζωές μας αν δεν το συνδυάζουμε με δύο άλλες αρετές: την χαρά και την αγάπη. Τα πρώτα λόγια του Χριστού μετά την Ανάσταση ήταν «Χαίρεται!».

Αυτό σημαίνει ότι η ζωή μας πρέπει να είναι γεμάτη με χαρά. Όχι την χαρά όμως όπως την εννοεί ο κόσμος. Αυτή η χαρά είναι προσωρινή και χάνεται με την πρώτη θλίψη που θα την διαδεχθεί. Η ζωή μας πρέπει να είναι γεμάτη με την χαρά του Χριστού, την χαρά της Αναστάσεως, την χαρά εκείνη που κανείς δεν μπορεί να μας αφαιρέσει καθώς είναι η χαρά της Αναστάσεως. Είναι η χαρά εκείνη που πηγάζει από τον Πανάγιο Τάφο του Κυρίου και μας οδηγεί στην ελπίδα. Έτσι, κάθε φορά που λέμε ο ένας στον άλλο «Χαίρεται» εννοούμε ότι πρέπει να έχουμε ελπίδα στην καρδιά μας, ελπίδα για ένα καλύτερο αύριο, ελπίδα για ειρήνη, ελπίδα για τη δική μας σωτηρία. Όπως έλεγε και ο αείμνηστος Καθηγητής π. Γεώργιος Μεταλληνός: «Λέγοντας «Χαίρετε», γνώριζε ότι λέγεις «Χριστός ανέστη» με ένα άλλο τρόπο.»

Η άλλη αφετή που είναι απαφαίτητη ώστε να γίνουμε φωτεινοί άνθφωποι είναι η αγάπη. Ο ίδιος ο Κύφιος μας πεφιγράφει το μέγεθος της αγάπης του Θεού για τον άνθφωπο : «οὕτως γὰρ ἡγάπησεν ὁ θεὸς τὸν κόσμον ὤστε τὸν υίὸν τὸν μονογενῆ ἔδωκεν, ἵνα πᾶς ὁ πιστεύων εἰς αὐτὸν μὴ ἀπόληται ἀλλὰ ἔχη ζωὴν αἰώνιον» (Ιωάν. 3:16). Ο Θεός δηλαδή αγαπά τόσο πολύ τον βυθισμένο στην αμαφτία κόσμο, ώστε παφέδωσε σε σταυφικό θάνατο τον μονογενή του Υιό· για να μη καταδικασθεί στην αιωνία απώλεια κάθε ένας που θα πιστεύει σε Αυτόν, αλλά να έχει αιώνια ζωή. Αυτό σημαίνει ότι ο Θεός είναι η τέλεια αγάπη και ζητά το ίδιο από εμάς: «ἐντολὴν καινὴν δίδωμι ὑμῖν ἵνα ἀγαπᾶτε ἀλλήλους, καθὼς ἠγάπησα ὑμᾶς ἵνα καὶ ὑμεῖς ἀγαπᾶτε ἀλλήλους» (Ιωάν. 3:13), δηλαδή: σας δίνω μία νέα εντολή· να αγαπάτε με όλη σας τη δύναμη ο ένας τον άλλον· όπως εγώ σας αγάπησα με πλήφη και τέλεια αγάπη, έτσι και σεις με την ίδια αγάπη πρέπει να συνδέεσθε μεταξύ σας. Και αν κάποιος φωτά τι πρέπει να κάνει για είναι σωστός Χριστιανός, ο Χριστός πάλι δίνει την απάντηση: «ἐν τούτω γνώσονται πάντες ὅτι ἐμοὶ μαθηταί ἐστε, ἐὰν ἀγάπην ἔχητε ἐν ἀλλήλοις» (Ιωάν. 3:35), δηλαδή λέγει ότι Χριστιανοί (μας αποκαλεί μαθητές Του) είναι μόνο εκείνοι που έχουν αγάπη μέσα τους και την δίνουν απλόχερα σε όλο τον κόσμο!

Από τα παραπάνω αγαπητοί μου καταλαβαίνουμε ότι η εορτή της Αναστάσεως είναι πολλά περισσότερα από μια λαμπάδα, λίγη ώρα στην Εκκλησία και πολύ φαγητό... Για να εορτάσουμε σωστά την Ανάσταση του Χριστού, πρέπει πρώτα να την ζήσουμε, να την κάνουμε τρόπο ζωής. Και πως την κάνουμε τρόπο ζωής; Όταν η ζωή μας είναι φωτεινή (αληθινή, χωρίς υποκρισία), χαρούμενη και γεμάτη αγάπη προς όλους ανεξαιρέτως!

Εύχομαι σε όλους το Φως της Αναστάσεως να πλημμυρίσει τις καρδιές και τις ζωές μας και η χαρά του Χριστού να γίνει τρόπος ζωής σε όλους μας!












How would you respond to someone who questions why God allows natural disasters to happen when we know God can intervene at any moment? If God is all-knowing, all-powerful, and all-loving, how can He allow evil things to happen?"

The common theme on the news, on social media, or at dinner-time conversations recently has seemed to focus a lot on negativity and often follows an "all is lost" type of precedent. It's all too easy and all too common to get swept away in the kinds of thoughts that flow with this kind of news. Kinds of thoughts that tell you that people are horrible,



and that the world is falling apart. With natural disasters on the rise and hate around every corner as the world continues to recover from COVID and reels with changing weather, it's only natural to feel lost. Looking for direction, one might start to wonder why all these bad things happen. And if they are truly looking in the right place for that direction, they might wonder why does *God* allow these bad things to happen. But do we even have the answer to that?

The answer to that question probably falls somewhere in the cosmos right next to the meaning of life, in that many spend their whole lives trying to figure it out. Is suffering really just a punishment for sin? Good Christian people follow God, yet still face tragedy. It feels impossible that the hundreds of lives lost in tsunamis and earthquakes and global pandemics are really just punishment. But many saints have put the idea out there that maybe we aren't supposed to know. What gives us the right to wonder why God does what He does? Yes, He is allknowing, but that doesn't mean that we should be, too. It means that we should trust Him. To ask why he allows suffering is to acknowledge that he is allowing it. It is recognizing that He is indeed all powerful and that He always has a plan, and that should be enough. The rest is in God's control, and that quiets the voice in your head saying there is no reason for this pain. We can only speculate what that reason is. Maybe it is some kind of punishment, but we are not the ones who can judge, so what is our role to speculate? Maybe it is a test to His followers, in which case we, of course, should remain steadfast in our faith. Continue to pray; continue to trust. St Mark the Ascetic wrote that "without affliction virtue has not been tested. Accept present afflictions for the sake of future blessings ...Do not think that every affliction is a consequence of sin. For there are some who did God's will, and yet are tested." Those future blessings mean that our human sadness and pain pales in comparison to God's love and to the opportunities of salvation when we accept Jesus. Test after test may be placed upon us, but shouldn't that encourage us further? Peter 4:12 tells us to "rejoice to the extent that you partake of Christ's sufferings, that when his glory is revealed, you may also be glad with exceeding joy." And Corinthians 4:18 tells us "For the things which are seen are temporary, but these things which are not seen are eternal." The things that people suffer here on earth is horrible. It is valid sadness and frustration, but it is only a moment next to the eternity that God offers us. Focus, instead, on the joy in our future with him, and at the same time, even recognize the joy that is currently around us.

It's difficult to turn away from bad things or to block out the negativity. It can become all-encompassing and dreadful, but when you are at rock bottom, it should cause you to look up at God. If he is behind tragedy, then he is, of course, behind all of the beauty and goodness in the world. Remember what all there is to be grateful for. Of course, it may seem counterintuitive to tell a struggling person to "look at the silver lining" but when you find the good, it is just as hard to look away from. Remember that God created all of that, too. It is equally woven into God's plan. This mindset has helped many people who have gone through tragedies to find God. Maybe that is the purpose of the suffering or maybe it is just a side effect, but we should take that message, just like the others, and run with it. Allow it to build on your faith and help others in a similar way. Now, when somebody asks you why bad things happen, you cannot say that they do not happen. There, of course, continues to be the news at six o'clock talking about politics and bad weather and sickness and sadness. It continues to be there, but do not try to give an explanation for those events. It is not our place, and we cannot say. What we can do is shift our attention to good and do good and remember what there is to be grateful for. Recognize that all of that goodness is God, too, so we must continue to trust in Him fully.

"Slandered without cause, convicted without a trial, exiled unjustly — this was the life endured by one of the greatest saints of our times — Saint Nektarios of Aegina. Forgiving others who hurt us that deeply and unjustly seems almost impossible. What can we learn from Saint Nektarios, whose life was about forgiving what some might call the impossible?"

Reverend Father(s), honorable judges, fellow speakers, families and friends, Good morning.

"Let us make man in Our image, after Our likeness" (Gen 1:26). Saint Nektarios of Aegina, the acclaimed "saint of our century" describes by example how we can once again reflect the image of God. Saint Nektarios was born in Thrace in 1846. He became a student and employee in Constantinople, a monk on Chios, and eventually a disciple of Patriarch Sophronius. The patriarch educated Nektarios, ordained him a bishop, and established him as Metropolitan of Pentapolis in Libya. Later, however, suffering slander from his brethren and betrayal from his spiritual father, he found himself without a Metropolis. Henceforth, the Metropolitan uprooted and moved to Athens seeking a position as a simple preacher. Eventually, Nektarios took the position of Dean at an ecclesiastical school near the city, later establishing a convent on Aegina. After moving to Aegina, offering spiritual direction to multitudes, and writing several spiritual works, Nektarios reposed in an Athenian hospital in 1920. Throughout his trials, he always bowed his head to the will of God. Saint Nektarios exemplified man's calling to fulfill his role as a creature in the image and likeness of God.

In chapter 53 of his prophecy, Saint Isaiah describes the role of the suffering servant. This role, as taught by the Church, describes the incarnate Christ. Humanity as a whole, however, is called to emulate our God; therefore, this chapter likewise applies to life in Christ. Isaiah concludes that the Christ is "a man of sorrows" and he is "despised and rejected of men" (Is. 53:3). This verse similarly applies to Saint Nektarios who found himself constantly in a state of repentance. He questioned why he found himself the subject of his own spiritual father's scorn. Similar to the accusers of the suffering servant, Saint Nektarios's accusers, ignoring his godly inner life, likewise viewed him as "afflicted," immoral, retrogressive, even deluded (Is. 53:4). Like the Lord, Nektarios, as "a lamb before the shearer is dumb," humbly accepted his trials (Is. 53:7). Having initially defended himself from slander, Nektarios eventually placed this issue in God's hands and transitioned to a life of silent submission to God's will.

Like Saint Nektarios, we are all made in God's image. His Holy life displays how we can share in Christ's glory. Saint Athanasius reveals that "God became man so that man might become god," theosis (54:3). Saint Nektarios's example displays that, through Christ's death and resurrection, we can achieve this ultimate goal of reflecting God's image. Saint Nektarios taught me this exact reality when, by his prayers, the film *Man of God* appeared in theaters. Saint Nektarios's example of humility, charity, and love indispensably initiated me, a recent inquirer into Holy Orthodoxy, into the spiritual life. Likewise, every single one of us can be transformed as Saint Nektarios was.

Theosis, a single word, concludes the essential theme of the life of Saint Nektarios. We ought to struggle so that the same word concludes ours. Nektarios grew up like any one of us, yet his life reveals how God created man to transfigure him into His likeness, the process of theosis. Whatever measure of grace God has granted us, we face the same struggle against sin to which Nektarios committed his life. What distinguishes us from Saint Nektarios is that he utilized his grace to its fullness. Inspired by his holy example, let us "seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness," to reattain the garment God so lovingly crafted for us (Matt. 6:33).

He beheld the image of Your Cross in the Heavens and, as Paul, he too did not receive the call from men. Your Apostle among Kings placed the care of the Royal City in Your hands. Through the intercessions of the Theotokos, O only Loving Lord, keep it ever in peace.

Kontakion in the Third Tone

Today, Constantine with his mother Helen present the Cross, the most precious wood. It shames unbelievers. It is a weapon of faithful kings against their adversaries. A great sign has come forth for us which is awesome in battle.

Reading:

This great and renowned sovereign of the Christians was the son of Constantius Chlorus (the ruler of the westernmost parts of the Roman empire), and of the blessed Helen. He was born in 272, in (according to some authorities) Naissus of Dardania, a city on the Hellespont. In 306, when his father died, he was proclaimed successor to his throne. In 312, on learning that Maxentius and Maximinus had joined forces against him, he marched into Italy, where, while at the head of his troops, he saw in the sky after midday, beneath the sun, a radiant pillar in the form of a cross with the words: "By this shalt thou conquer." The following night, our Lord Jesus Christ appeared to him in a dream and declared to him the power of the Cross and its significance. When he arose in the morning, he immediately ordered that a labarum be made (which is a banner or standard of victory over the enemy) in the form of a cross, and he inscribed on it the Name of Jesus Christ. On the 28th Of October, he attacked and mightily conquered Maxentius, who drowned in the Tiber River while fleeing. The following day, Constantine entered Rome in triumph and was proclaimed Emperor of the West by the Senate, while Licinius, his brother-in-law, ruled in the East. But out of malice, Licinius later persecuted the Christians. Constantine fought him once and again, and utterly destroyed him in 324, and in this manner he became monarch over the West and the East. Under him and because of him all the persecutions against the Church ceased. Christianity triumphed and idolatry was overthrown. In 325 he gathered the First Ecumenical Council in Nicaea, which he himself personally addressed. In 324, in the ancient city of Byzantium, he laid the foundations of the new capital of his realm, and solemnly inaugurated it on May 11, 330, naming it after himself, Constantinople. Since the throne of the imperial rule was transferred thither from Rome, it was named New Rome, the inhabitants of its domain were called Romans, and it was considered the continuation of the Roman Empire. Falling ill near Nicomedia, he requested to receive divine Baptism, according to Eusebius (The Life of Constantine. Book IV, 61-62), and also according to Socrates and Sozomen; and when he had been deemed worthy of the Holy Mysteries, he reposed in 337, on May 21 or 22, the day of Pentecost, having lived sixty-five years, of which he ruled for thirty-one years. His remains were transferred to Constantinople and were deposed in the Church of the Holy Apostles, which had been built by him (see Homily XXVI on Second Corinthians by Saint John Chrysostom).

As for his holy mother Helen, after her son had made the Faith of Christ triumphant throughout the Roman Empire, she undertook a journey to Jerusalem and found the Holy Cross on which our Lord was crucified (see Sept. 13 and 14). After this, Saint Helen, in her zeal to glorify Christ, erected churches in Jerusalem at the sites of the Crucifixion and Resurrection, in Bethlehem at the cave where our Saviour was born, another on the Mount of Olives whence He ascended into Heaven, and many others throughout the Holy Land, Cyprus, and elsewhere. She was proclaimed Augusta, her image was stamped upon golden coins, and two cities were named Helenopolis after her in Bithynia and in Palestine. Having been thus glorified for her piety, she departed to the Lord being about eighty years of age, according to some in the year 330, according to others, in 336.



And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work."



Saint Christoforos of Lycia the Great Martyr

The Holy Martyr Christoforos lived during the third century and suffered about the year 250, during the reign of the emperor Decius (249-251). There are various accounts of his life and miracles, and he is widely venerated throughout the world. He was a man of great stature and unusual strength. Before Baptism he was named Reprebus because his disfigured appearance. Even before Baptism, Reprebus confessed his faith in Christ and denounced those who persecuted Christians.

Because of his renowned strength, 200 soldiers were assigned to bring him before the emperor Decius. Reprebus submitted without resistance. Several miracles occurred along the way. The soldiers surrounding him were astonished at these miracles. They came to believe in Christ and they were baptized along with Reprebus by Saint Babylus of Antioch (September 4).

Christoforos once made a vow to serve the greatest king in the world, so he first offered to serve the local king. Saint Babylas of Antioch told him that he could best serve Christ by doing well the task for which he was best suited. Therefore, he became a ferryman, carrying people across a river on his shoulders. One stormy night, he carried a Child Who insisted on being taken across at that very moment. With every step he took, the Child seemed to become heavier. Halfway across the stream, he felt that his strength would give out, and that he and the Child would be drowned in the river. As they reached the other side, the Child told him that he had just carried all the sins of the world on his shoulders. Then He ordered Christoforos to plant his walking stick in the ground. As he did so, the stick grew into a giant tree. Then he recognized Christ, the King Whom he had vowed to serve.

Saint Christoforos was brought before the emperor, who tried to make him renounce Christ, not by force but by cunning. He summoned two profligate women, Callinika and Aquilina, and commanded them to persuade Christoforos to deny Christ, and to offer sacrifice to idols. Instead, the women were converted to Christ by him. When they returned to the emperor, they declared themselves to be Christians. Therefore, they were subjected to fierce beatings, and so they received the crown of martyrdom.

Decius also sentenced to execution the soldiers who had been sent after Saint Christoforos, but who now believed in Christ. The emperor ordered that the martyr be thrown into a red-hot metal box. Saint Christoforos, however, did not experience any suffering and he remained unharmed. After many fierce torments they finally beheaded the martyr with a sword. This occurred in the year 250 in Lycia. By his miracles the holy Martyr Christoforos converted as many as 50,000 pagans to Christ, as Saint Ambrose of Milan testifies.

The name Christoforos means "Christ-bearer." This can refer to the saint carrying the Savior across the river, and it may also refer to Saint Christoforos bearing Christ within himself (Galatians 2:20).



Πάντοτε μ' άρεσε να πετάω πέτρες στα ήρεμα νερά μιάς λίμνης και να παρατηρώ τον κυματισμό των νερών στην επιφανεία της. Ο Ελληνικός πολιτισμός, αυτή η υπέροχη σύλληψη και δώρο των Ελλήνων αρχικά στην Δύση και σήμερα σ' όλον τον κόσμο, είναι δόνηση που δημιούργησε την αρχή της εξόδου της ανθρωπότητας από την άγνοια στην γνώση, από τον φόβο στην λογική εξήγηση, από την δεισιδαιμονία στην δημιουργία.

Ο Ελληνικός πολιτισμός και τρόπος σκέψεως εξαπλώθηκε στον κόσμο σε ομόκεντρους κύκλους. Concentric Circles – The Language of Homer and Contemporary Greek Language

I always liked to throw stones on the calm waters of a lake to watch the rippling of the water on its surface. In the beginning, there is a small disturbance at the point of impact of the stone with water. Immediately after, a first small circle appears whose diameter increases continuously. After the first circle, a second larger one appears, and then a third one, that goes on. We observe traveling concentric circles until the energy of the initial impact is exhausted.

The Hellenic civilization and culture, these wonderful conceptions, and gifts of the Greeks initially to the West, and today to the whole world, is the vibration that initiated the exit of mankind from ignorance to knowledge, from fear to rational explanation, from superstition to creation.

Greek culture and way of thinking spread in the world in concentric circles. Just as we know the center of the concentric circles on the surface of the lake, so we know the center of contemporary civilization. That center is located on the Acropolis, Delphi, the frescoes of the monastery of Saint Luke, Delphi, Plato, Aristotle, the Fathers of the Church, the Greek language, and the seven Greek vowels. This center is known and will illuminate the humanity until the end of the world.

Now let us see how many words from Homer exist in English. The Homeric words in contemporary Greek are presented in the Greek text. Below are the first verses of Homer Odyssey text, the second literary work after Homer's Iliad of the West. The word introduced in modern English language from Homeric Greek is in parenthesis.




YAL – Young Adult League

Great and Holy Pascha

Reading:

Mary Magdalene, and the other women who were present at the burial of our Saviour on Friday evening, returned from Golgotha to the city and prepared fragrant spices and myrrh, so that they might anoint the body of Jesus. On the morrow, because of the law which forbids work on the day of the Sabbath, they rested for the whole day. But at early dawn on the Sunday that followed, almost thirty-six hours since the death of the Life-giving Redeemer, they came to the sepulchre with the spices to anoint His body. While they were considering the difficulty of rolling away the stone from the door of the sepulchre, there was a fearful earthquake; and an Angel, whose countenance shone like lightning and whose garment was white as snow, rolled away the stone and sat upon it. The guards that were there became as dead from fear and took to flight. The women, however, went into the sepulchre, but did not find the Lord's body. Instead, they saw two other Angels in the form of youths clothed in white, who told them that the Saviour was risen, and they sent forth the women, who ran to proclaim to the disciples these gladsome tidings. Then Peter and John arrived, having learned from Mary Magdalene what had come to pass, and

when they entered the tomb, they found only the winding sheets. Therefore, they returned again to the city with joy, as heralds now of the supernatural Resurrection of Christ, Who in truth was seen alive by the disciples on this day on five occasions.

Our Lord, then, was crucified, died, and was buried on Friday, before the setting of the sun, which was the first of His "three days" in the grave; observing the mystical Sabbath, that "seventh day" in which it is said that the Lord "rested from all His works" (Gen. 2:2-3), He passed all of Saturday in the grave; and He arose "while it was yet dark, very early in the morning" on Sunday, the third day, which, according to the Hebrew reckoning, began after sunset on Saturday.

As we celebrate today this joyous Resurrection, we greet and embrace one another in Christ, thereby demonstrating our Saviour's victory over death and corruption, and the destruction of our ancient enmity with God, and His reconciliation toward us, and our inheritance of life everlasting. The feast itself is called Pascha, which is derived from the Hebrew word which means "passover"; because Christ, Who suffered and arose, has made us to pass over from the curse of Adam and slavery to the devil and death unto our primal freedom and blessedness. In addition, this day of this particular week, which is the first of all the rest, is dedicated to the honour of the Lord; in honour and remembrance of the Resurrection, the Apostles transferred to this day the rest from labour that was formerly assigned to the Sabbath of the ancient Law.



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
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
