









“Father, ruler over all, and Logos and Spirit, O Nature divine, in three Hypostases united, transcending essence and divinity, in You have we been baptized; we praise and bless and worship You, unto all the ages” (8th ode of the Resurrection)



My beloved parishioners, Christ is Risen!

As we enter the month of June, we still find ourselves bathed in the bright and clear light of Jesus Christ's Resurrection. On June 13th we are completing the liturgical cycle of 40 days since Easter, by celebrating the Divine Ascension of Christ into Heaven. Fr. George Florovsky, a prominent theologian of the 20th century, writes: *"in the Ascension resides the meaning and the fullness of Christ's Resurrection....and with Christ, man's nature ascends also"*. The ascension of Christ signifies human's first entry into the divine glorification and dignity, for which he was originally created, and the reunion of man with God, as He deified the human nature that he took on at His birth, by taking His body to heaven.

Only a few moments before His Ascension, the Lord gave a promise to His disciples, that they would receive power from on high, when the Holy Spirit would come upon them. This promise was fulfilled on the day of Pentecost, the Feast we are celebrating on Sunday, June 23rd. Our Parish and Community is uniquely blessed to be named after the Holy and Undivided Trinity, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

Our entire Orthodox Faith is founded on the truth of the Trinity. We are brought into the Church and baptized in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, in accordance with our Lord's Great Commission: *"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit"* (Matthew 28,19). The center of our spiritual lives, the Divine Liturgy, begins with the glorification of the Holy Trinity: *"Blessed is the Kingdom of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit"*. Everything we do or say within the church context is based on the Trinity: we make the sign of the Cross three times, we make three prostrations, we offer hymns in a thrice form, etc. All in all, this number-based veneration that we use in our daily spiritual life has penetrated our practice, as it derives from the ultimate veneration of the Three Persons of God. However, we do not worship three Gods, but One in three hypostases; the Three Persons are one in essence but inseparable, one undivided Being, one substance. The Three Persons are undivided, but distinct, yet co-equal, co-eternal, omnipotent, omniscient, and benevolent.

It is understandable that it is hard for the human logic and the rational way of thinking that we follow to comprehend all of the above, and beyond the above. However, the paramount truth of the Trinity is rather a mystery that requires faith to be revealed to us. We can never understand any of this, if we try to explain it by logic. Our mind -as creatures- is too small to contain the fulness of the truth and existence of the Creator. Only through faith, and certainly through our participation in the sacramental life of our Church, God will reveal Himself to us, and He will help us understand the doctrine of the Holy, Consubstantial, Life-giving, and Undivided Trinity. I believe that the following troparion from the Vespers of the Feast of the Holy Spirit can help us reflect on the Truth of the Holy Trinity: *"Come, all people, let us worship the one God in three hypostases: the Son in the Father and the Holy Spirit. The Father, outside of time, begat the Son, co-eternal and sharing the throne, and the Holy Spirit was in the Father, glorified with the Son. One power, one essence, one Godhead, which we all worship and we say: "Holy God, You created all things through the Son by the cooperation of the Holy Spirit. Holy Mighty, through You we came to know the Father and the Holy Spirit came to the world. Holy Immortal, the Comforter Spirit, You proceed from the Father and rest in the Son. O Holy Trinity, glory to You!"*.

My dear beloved parishioners and friends, we are so blessed and honored as a community to bear the name of the Holy Trinity. We proudly bear the name of our Triune God who will save us if we follow His will. At the same time, this is also a responsibility; we must always try to glorify His Holy Name, through our actions, our decisions, our life, not only on a personal level, but as a Greek Orthodox Parish and Community as well. On Sunday, June 23rd, we celebrate the Feast of Pentecost. It is a most auspicious and sacred day in the ecclesiastical year and in the lives of every Orthodox faithful. Please come to the Divine Liturgy that day, regardless of the sirens of the “summer”, that tell us it is not necessary to be in Church every Sunday, now that the temperatures are high...Come and stay for Vespers that day, following the Divine Liturgy in the morning. This is when we kneel and the priest offers the wonderful prayers of Pentecost, as we are receiving the Divine Grace of the Holy Spirit, like the Apostles did on the day of Pentecost. Also, the day after Pentecost, Monday, June 24th, is the Feast of the Holy Spirit. Traditionally, on that day our Parish celebrates its nameday. I know it is a “busy” Monday for many, but if you have the chance, please come to the Divine Liturgy and Worship with us on that great Feast.

Well, the summer is upon us! This is the perfect time to relax, however not from Church..., and to renew ourselves in anticipation of the rapidly upcoming Fall and Winter. Nevertheless, the month of June is a very busy one for our Parish, as it begins with our Greek Festival and ends with the nameday celebration of our Church. Our Festival will bring us together and will give us the opportunity to serve our visitors and exhibit our deep traditions, history, and food! I am looking forward to seeing you there and I would like to thank the countless volunteers of our Parish who work hard every year to ensure that our Festival will be successful, and our guests will have a great time.



Αγαπητοί μου Ενορίτες, Χριστός Ανέστη!

Ο μήνας Ιούνιος σηματοδοτεί την αρχή του καλοκαιριού και μας δίνει την αίσθηση της ξεκούρασης και χαλάρωσης από τους τρελούς ρυθμούς του υπόλοιπου χρόνου. Βέβαια, τον φετινό Ιούνιο έχουμε την ευλογία να συνεχίζουμε να εορτάζουμε την Ανάσταση του Χριστού, καθώς εορτάσαμε το Πάσχα πολύ αργά φέτος. Μέχρι τις 12 του Ιουνίου θα ψάλλουμε πανηγυρικά το «Χριστός Ανέστη» και θα διατρανώνουμε την αλήθεια της Αναστάσεως, η οποία διαπερνά την ύπαρξή μας και μας χαρακτηρίζει ως Ορθοδόξους Χριστιανούς.

Στις 13 Ιουνίου εορτάζουμε την Θεία Ανάληψη, το γεγονός δηλαδή της «εν σώματι» μεταφοράς του Κυρίου μας στους Ουρανούς και την ενθρόνισή Του στα δεξιά του Πατέρα Του. Η εορτή της Αναλήψεως επισφραγίζει και συμπληρώνει την εορτή της Αναστάσεως, είναι δηλαδή η συνέχιση και η ολοκλήρωση του σχεδίου του Θεού για την σωτηρία του ανθρώπου. Η Ανάληψη του Χριστού σημαίνει ότι ο ουρανός δέχθηκε την πεσμένη από την αμαρτία ανθρώπινη φύση, σημαίνει ότι ο άνθρωπος ξανακέρδισε την θέση που είχε στον Παράδεισο. Αυτή όμως η θέση στον Παράδεισο δεν θα μας δοθεί μαγικά, αλλά με πολύ αγώνα και προσπάθεια. Ο Χριστός μας άνοιξε την πόρτα του Παραδείσου. Σε εμάς απομένει να εργαστούμε ώστε να διαβούμε αυτή την πόρτα της σωτηρίας.

Κατά την Ανάληψη, ο Κύριος έδωσε μία υπόσχεση, ότι θα στείλει στον κόσμο τον Παράκλητο, το Πνεύμα της Αληθείας, το Πανάγιο Πνεύμα. Αυτό λοιπόν εορτάζουμε την ημέρα της Πεντηκοστής: την κάθοδο του Παναγίου Πνεύματος στους Αποστόλους και την αρχή του σωτηριώδους έργου της Εκκλησίας στον κόσμο. Από την ημέρα της Πεντηκοστής έχουμε συνεχή και αδιάκοπη την παρουσία και την χάρη του Αγίου Πνεύματος εντός της Εκκλησίας.

Η Ενορία μας έχει την μεγάλη ευλογία να φέρει το όνομα της Αγίας Τριάδος. Ενώ οι περισσότερες Εκκλησίες έχουν το όνομα κάποιου Αγίου ή Αγίας, ή κάποιας εορτής, η δική μας Εκκλησία τιμά το Όνομα του Παναγίου Τριαδικού Θεού. Εμείς, οι Ορθόδοξοι Χριστιανοί, πιστεύουμε όχι αφηρημένα σε κάποια ανώτερη δύναμη όπως λένε μερικοί, αλλά πιστεύουμε στον Τριαδικό Θεό, τον Πατέρα, τον Υιό και το Άγιο Πνεύμα, Τριάδα ομοούσιο και αχώριστο. Δεν πιστεύουμε σε τρεις Θεούς αλλά σε Ένα Θεό «έν τρισί προσώποις». Ο μακαριστός Μητροπολίτης Γόρτυνος Ιερεμίας γράφει για το δόγμα της Αγίας Τριάδος:

A. Ο Θεός είναι τρία Πρόσωπα, αλλά ενωμένα στην μία θεία Ουσία. Είναι ομοούσια. Η, για να το πούμε διαφορετικά, ο Θεός είναι ένας στην Ουσία, αλλά είναι Τρισυπόστατος, είναι δηλαδή τρία τα Πρόσωπα της θεότητας.

B. Τα τρία θεία Πρόσωπα, ο Πατήρ, ο Υιός και το Άγιο Πνεύμα, αν και είναι ομοούσια και έχουν τις ίδιες θείες ιδιότητες, όμως έχουν και προσωπικά ιδιώματα. Τα ιδιώματα αυτά δεν είναι κοινά και των τριών Προσώπων, γιαντό τα λέμε «ακοινοποίητα» ιδιώματα: ο Πατέρας είναι αγέννητος· ο Υιός γεννάται από τον Πατέρα και το Άγιο Πνεύμα εκπορεύεται από τον Πατέρα. Οι άγιοι Πατέρες καλούν την Αγία Τριάδα Μονάδα εν Τριάδι, μια Τρισυπόστατη Ενότητα. Η Εκκλησία προσευχομένη στην Αγία Τριάδα κατά την λατρεία την επικαλείται στον ενικό και όχι στον πληθυντικό αριθμό, λόγω της μιάς θείας Ουσίας. Για παράδειγμα: «Οτι Σε (και όχι «Υμιάς») αινοῦσι πάσαι αι δυνάμεις των ουρανών και Σοί (και όχι «Υμίν») την δόξαν αναπέμπουσι, τω Πατρί και τω Υιῷ και τω Αγίῳ Πνεύματι, νυν και αεί και εις τους αιῶνας των αιῶνων».

Θα μπορούσαμε να γράψουμε πολλά για το δόγμα της Αγίας Τριάδος. Είναι αλήθεια ότι κάθε άνθρωπος που σκέπτεται μόνο με την λογική, αδυνατεί να κατανοήσει το Τριαδικό δόγμα. Σκεπτόμενος με τα ανθρώπινα μέτρα, δεν μπορεί να συνειδητοποιήσει τα μεγαλεία της πίστεώς μας. Γι' αυτό έχουμε χιλιάδες αιρέσεις που μας ταλαιπωρούν, ακριβώς γιατί οι άνθρωποι προσπαθούν να εξηγήσουν τον Θεό με τα δικά τους δεδομένα, με το μικρό και πεπερασμένο νου τους. Πρέπει λοιπόν να αφήσουμε τη σκέψη και τη διάνοιά μας να γεμίσει με την Χάρη του Θεού, και να τον παρακαλούμε συνέχεια να φωτίζει το μυαλό μας ώστε να σκεφτόμαστε όχι ως άνθρωποι αυτού του κόσμου αλλά ως παιδιά του Θεού. Για να το πετύχουμε αυτό χρειάζεται να έχουμε πίστη, ταπείνωση και Μυστηριακή ζωή. **Πίστη**, ώστε να αναγνωρίσουμε την ύπαρξη και το μεγαλείο του Θεού. **Ταπείνωση** ώστε να ελκύσουμε την Χάρη του Θεού, αναγνωρίζοντας ότι είμαστε απλά δημιουργήματα του Θεού που έχουμε ανάγκη από τον Θείο φωτισμό, και **Μυστηριακή Ζωή**, δηλαδή τακτική συμμετοχή στα Μυστήρια της Εκκλησίας μας και στη Θεία Ευχαριστία, μέσα από τα οποία ο Θεός μας «αποκαλύπτεται».

Αγαπητοί μου, έφτασε το καλοκαίρι. Είναι καιρός να ξεκουραστούμε λίγο και να ανανεωθούμε ώστε να συνεχίσουμε τον αγώνα της ζωής. Αυτή η ξεκούραση όμως δεν σημαίνει ότι διακόπτουμε και την συμμετοχή μας στη ζωή της Εκκλησίας. Τα ανθρώπινα προβλήματα δεν σταματούν χειμώνα-καλοκαίρι, και μόνο με την βοήθεια του Θεού που παίρνουμε μέσα στην Εκκλησία μπορούμε να τα αντιμετωπίσουμε. Θυμηθείτε ότι ο διάβολος δεν κάνει διακοπές. Δουλεύει ασταμάτητα και καθημερινά, ιδιαίτερα το καλοκαίρι, ώστε να μας παραπλανήσει και να χάσουμε το δρόμο μας. Γι' αυτό, όπου και αν είμαστε το καλοκαίρι, όπου και αν κάνουμε διακοπές, ας μην ξεχάσουμε τις Κυριακές να πάμε στην Εκκλησία.

Επίσης σας παρακαλώ πολύ να έλθετε όλοι στην Θεία Λειτουργία την Κυριακή της Πεντηκοστής, 23 Ιουνίου, και όσοι μπορείτε την Δευτέρα του Αγίου Πνεύματος, 24 Ιουνίου, που γιορτάζει και η Εκκλησία μας. Ελάτε να λάβετε την Χάρη του Αγίου Πνεύματος κατά την διάρκεια του Εσπερινού της Γονυκλισίας που τελείται την Κυριακή της Πεντηκοστής αμέσως μετά την Θεία Λειτουργία, όπου γονατίζουμε και ο Ιερέας διαβάσει τις ευχές της Πεντηκοστής.

Εύχομαι μέσα από την καρδιά μου χρόνια πολλά στην ευλογημένη Ενορία μας και καλό καλοκαίρι σε όλους! Καλή επιτυχία στο Φεστιβάλ μας και θερμές ευχαριστίες στους πολλούς εθελοντές και βοηθούς, που θυσιάζουν πολύτιμο χρόνο ώστε να βοηθήσουν και να προσφέρουν. Ο Τριαδικός Θεός να τους ευλογεί!



Πουθενά και παντού

Ο ήλιος έκανε την αέναη περιστροφή του γύρω από την γη και φθάσαμε πάλι στο Καλοκαίρι και ετοιμάζω τις βαλίτσες μου και σχεδιάζω που και πως θα περάσω τον λίγο χρόνο στην Ελλάδα. Όμως τα τελευταία χρόνια κάτι βασανίζει το μυαλό μου. Προσπαθώ να καταλάβω αν πράγματι ανήκω στην χώρα που άφησα πίσω ή αν την μοιράζομαι και κατά πόσο με την νέα μου χώρα όπου μετανάστευσα νέος.

Αυτό που μου λείπει περισσότερο στην Αμερική είναι η γειτονιά όπου μεγάλωσα, όπου μοιραζόμουν την καθημερινότητα μου με τους γείτονες, σε καλές και κακές στιγμές, τις χαρές και τις λύπες μας. Όπου όλοι γιορτάζαμε τις ίδιες γιορτές, χαιρετούσαμε και ανταγωνιζόμασταν ό ένας τον άλλον, με ειλικρίνια, ψευτιά και ενίοτε με εντάσεις ακόμη και για μικροπράγματα και μιλούσαμε την ίδια γλώσσα.

Έχω αρχίσει να μαθαίνω να ζώ με αυτή την πραγματικότητα. Στην Ελλάδα προσπαθώ να μην επιτίρομαι για τις επιτυχίες μου και την οικονομική άνεση που μας προσφέρει απλόχερα η πλούσια αυτοκρατορία μας, αν και δεν κρύβονται, για να μην προκαλέσω κανέναν. Όλοι μισούν και δικαίως την αλαζονεία. Οι φίλοι και συγγενείς μου στην Ελλάδα μου προσφέρουν το ανεκτίμητο δώρο της μοιρασιάς των στιγμών της νιότης που περάσαμε μαζί. Τα αισθήματα αγάπης είναι αμοιβαία.

Στην Αμερική προσπαθώ να διαφημίζω όπου βρεθώ την σημαντική και αναμφισβήτητη συνεισφορά των προγόνων μου στην αυτοκρατορία μας, όπως και την δική μας σύγχρονη συνεισφορά στο γίνεσθαι της.

Ανήκω πουθενά και παντού ταυτόχρονα! Είμαι πολίτης του κόσμου, ένας Έλληνας που για αιώνες ταξίδευε και δημιούργησε πολιτισμό! Αμφότερες οι γώρες μου έδωσαν το εν ζειν! Είμαι ευγνώμων και στις δύο!

But in recent years something has been tormenting my mind. I am trying to understand if I really belong to the country I left behind or if I share it and to what extent with my new country where I immigrated to as a young lad.

What I most miss in America is the neighborhood where I grew up, where I shared my daily life with the neighbors, in good and bad times, our joys and sorrows. Where we all celebrated the same holidays, greeted, and competed with each other, with honesty, lies and sometimes tensions even over small things and above all spoke the same language.

Alas, All-tamer time! That neighborhood we left behind no longer exists. Beloved neighbors and friends have gone forever. New neighbors you don't know fill the void. You feel that your place is not as you left it, you are a bit of an outsider.

There is no such neighborhood in America. Not because our neighbors are different, or bad people, but because they come from all over the world without common habits and experiences with yours.

In Greece, everyone calls me American, rather than by my name. I am a member of the contemporary empire that everyone admires and hates at the same time! Here I am the Greek who carries on his shoulders a huge and unique history, the basis of the contemporary Western civilization, which causes admiration, awe, jealousy, even displeasure **to the point of questioning whether we are related to our glorious ancestors.**

I'm starting to learn to live with this reality. In Greece, I try not to brag about my successes and the financial comfort that our rich empire generously offers us, although it is obvious, so as not to provoke anyone. Everyone hates arrogance and rightly so. My friends and relatives in Greece offer me the priceless gift of sharing the sweet moments of our youth we spent together. The feelings of love are mutual.

In America I try to advertise wherever I am the significant and undeniable contribution of my ancestors to our empire, as well as our own modern contribution to its making.

I belong nowhere and everywhere at the same time! I am a citizen of the world, a Hellene who traveled and created civilization for centuries! Both countries gave me the well being! I am grateful and thank both!



The Nativity of St. John the Baptist (Feast Day: June 24)

Reading:

He that was greater than all who are born of women, the Prophet who received God's testimony that he surpassed all the Prophets, was born of the aged and barren Elizabeth (Luke 1: 7) and filled all his kinsmen, and those that lived round about, with gladness and wonder. But even more wondrous was that which followed on the eighth day when he was circumcised, that is, the day on which a male child receives his name. Those present called him Zacharias, the name of his father. But the mother said, "Not so, but he shall be called John." Since the child's father was unable to speak, he was asked, by means of a sign, to indicate the child's name. He then asked for a tablet and wrote, "His name is John." And immediately Zacharias' mouth was opened, his tongue was loosed from its silence of nine months, and filled with the Holy Spirit, he blessed the God of Israel, Who had fulfilled the promises made to their fathers, and had visited them that were sitting in darkness

and the shadow of death, and had sent to them the light of salvation. Zacharias prophesied concerning the child also, saying that he would be a Prophet of the Most High and Forerunner of Jesus Christ. And the child John, who was filled with grace, grew and waxed strong in the Spirit; and he was in the wilderness until the day of his showing to Israel (Luke 1:57-80). His name is a variation of the Hebrew "Johanan," which means "Yah is gracious."

Apolytikion in the Fourth Tone

O Prophet and Forerunner of the presence of Christ, we who fervently honor you cannot worthily praise you. For by your revered and glorious birth the barrenness of your mother and the muteness of your father were unbound, and the incarnation of the Son of God is proclaimed to the world.

Kontakion in the Third Tone

She that once was barren doth today bring forth Christ's Forerunner, John, the culmination and the crown of all the Prophets. For when he, in River Jordan, laid his hand on Him Whom the Prophets preached aforetime, he was revealed as God the Word's fore-chosen Prophet, His mighty preacher, and His Forerunner in grace.



90th Anniversary

A History of the Wilmington Greek Community/Memories

After World War I, many Greek immigrants and their families had settled in Wilmington, DE. Early businesses were, New York Restaurant, Presto Restaurant, Delaware Lunch, Govatos Candy Co., Kramedas Produce and Lazopoulos Liquor Co.

In 1934, the Greek Orthodox Community was chartered. The first parish council comprised of Charles Tarabicos, Dr. George Boines, Elefterios Lazopoulos, Louis Liarakos, John Govatos, Gregory Kramedas, Andrew Spiliadis, and Jack Cozamanis.

In 1939, the property at 808 N Broom Street was purchased from the T. Coleman duPont Estate and fund raising began for the building of the proposed church.

In 1940, Jack Cozamanis was hired as the Greek School teacher and classes were held on the second floor of the Law Building at 9th and Market Street, future site of Woolworth's. On the Broom Street property, the automobile and stable building was remodeled to be used as a temporary church and community center. The kitchen was used for Greek School classes. There was a pool on the property which was used for a short time. The Philoptochos Society and Order of AHEPA would sponsor dances and events in order to raise funds for the building of the church.

On November 11, 1951. The first liturgy was held in the new church. Its name was chosen as Holy Trinity after a church in the village of Charles Tarabicos.

The caretaker's house was converted into the residence of our parish priest, Father Stamatios Ganiaris and his family. It was demolished in 1973 and the north parking lot was completed.

In 1972, Father Stamatios Ganiaris and parish council President James Tarabicos, with members of the Parish Council, met with Bishop Silas to present the plans to implement the Fair Share program to replace the dues system of the Parish. Permission was granted for the year 1972 as the Pilot Program of the Archdiocese. In October 1972, Archbishop Iakovos endorsed the program at the Clergy-Laity Congress and it was unanimously passed to launch the program on the national level. The Wilmington Community of Holy Trinity became the first community to do so in the nation.

In 1973, Parish Council President James Tarabicos appointed Dr. James Kakavas as chairman of the finance committee and Dr. Dimitri Staikos as the chairman of the building committee for the construction of the Hellenic Community Center. Ground was broken in 1976 and it was completed and dedicated in 1978.





# HOLY PENTECOST

## **Introduction**

The Feast of Holy Pentecost is celebrated each year on the fiftieth day after the Great and Holy Feast of Pascha (Easter) and ten days after the Feast of the Ascension of Christ. The Feast is always celebrated on a Sunday. The Feast commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles on the day of Pentecost, a feast of the Jewish tradition. It also celebrates the establishment of the Church through the preaching of the Apostles and the baptism of the thousands who on that day believed in the Gospel message of salvation through Jesus Christ. The Feast is also seen as the culmination of the revelation of the Holy Trinity.

## **Historical Background**

The story of Pentecost is found in the book of The Acts of the Apostles. In Chapter two we are told that the Apostles of our Lord were gathered together in one place. Suddenly, a sound came from heaven like a rushing wind, filling the entire house where they were sitting. Then, tongues of fire appeared, and one sat upon each one of Apostles. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages as directed by the Spirit (Acts 2:1-4).

This miraculous event occurred on the Jewish Feast of Pentecost, celebrated by the Jews on the fiftieth day after the Passover as the culmination of the Feast of Weeks (Exodus 34:22; Deuteronomy 16:10). The Feast of Weeks began on the third day after the Passover with the presentation of the first harvest sheaves to God, and it concluded on Pentecost with the offering of two loaves of unleavened bread, representing the first products of the harvest (Leviticus 23:17-20; Deuteronomy 16:9-10).


Since the Jewish Feast of Pentecost was a great pilgrimage feast, many people from throughout the Roman Empire were gathered in Jerusalem on this day. When the people in Jerusalem heard the sound, they came together and heard their own languages being spoken by the Apostles (Acts 2:5-6). The people were amazed, knowing that some of those speaking were Galileans, and not men who would normally speak many different languages. They wondered what this meant, and some even thought the Apostles were drunk (Acts 2:7-13). Peter, hearing these remarks, stood up and addressed the crowd. He preached to the people regarding the Old Testament prophecies about the coming of the Holy Spirit. He spoke about Jesus Christ and His death and glorious Resurrection. Great conviction fell upon the people, and they asked the Apostles, "What shall we do?" Peter said to them, "Repent, and let every one of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins; and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:38-39).

The Bible records that on that day about three thousand were baptized. Following, the book of Acts states that the newly baptized continued daily to hear the teaching of the Apostles, as the early Christians met together for fellowship, the breaking of bread, and for prayer. Many wonderful signs and miracles were done through the Apostles, and the Lord added to the Church daily those who were being saved (Acts 2:42-47).

## **Icon of the Feast**

The icon of the Feast of Pentecost is known as "The Descent of the Holy Spirit". It is an icon of bold colors of red and gold signifying that this is a great event. The movement of the icon is from the top to the bottom. At the top of the icon is a semicircle with rays coming from it. The rays are pointing toward the Apostles, and the tongues of fire are seen descending upon each one of them signifying the descent of the Holy Spirit.

The building in the background of the icon represents the upper room where the Disciples of Christ gathered after the



Ascension. The Apostles are shown seated in a semicircle which shows the unity of the Church. Included in the group of the Apostles is Saint Paul, who, though not present with the others on the day of Pentecost, became an Apostle of the Church and the greatest missionary. Also included are the four Evangelists, Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, holding books of the Gospel, while the other Apostles are holding scrolls that represent the teaching authority given to them by Christ.

In the center of the icon below the Apostles, a royal figure is seen against a dark background. This is a symbolic figure, Cosmos, representing the people of the world living in darkness and sin, and involved in pagan worship. However, the figure carries in his hands a cloth containing scrolls which represent the teaching of the Apostles. The tradition of the Church holds that the Apostles carried the message of the Gospel to all parts of the world.

In the icon of Pentecost we see the fulfillment of the promise of the Holy Spirit, sent down upon the Apostles who will teach the nations and baptize them in the name of the Holy Trinity. Here we see that the Church is brought together and sustained in unity through the presence and work of the Holy Spirit, that the Spirit guides the Church in the missionary endeavor throughout the world, and that the Spirit nurtures the Body of Christ, the Church, in truth and love.

### **Orthodox Christian Celebration of the Feast of Pentecost**

This great Feast of the Church is celebrated with the Divine Liturgy of Saint John Chrysostom on the Sunday that is the fiftieth day after the celebration of Pascha. The Liturgy is conducted on the day of the Feast, and is preceded the evening before by a Great Vespers service and on the morning of the Feast by the Matins service. On the day of the Feast a Vespers service is conducted that includes the kneeling prayers. These prayers mark the beginning of the practice of kneeling during the Liturgy at the time when the holy gifts of bread and wine are consecrated as the body and blood of Christ. The practice of kneeling has been suspended during the Paschal season. On the Monday following the Feast, the Divine Liturgy is conducted in commemoration of the All-holy and Life-creating and All-powerful Spirit, Who is God, and One of the Trinity, and of one honor and one essence and one glory with the Father and the Son (From the Synaxarion of the Feast).

### **Prayer of the Holy Spirit**

Heavenly King, Comforter, the Spirit of Truth, everywhere present and filling all things, Treasury of blessings and Giver of life: come and abide in us, cleanse us from every impurity and save our souls, O Good One.

### **Hymns of the Feast**

#### **Apolytikion (Plagal Tone Four)**

Blessed are You, O Christ our God, who made fisherman all-wise, by sending down upon them the Holy Spirit, and through them, drawing all the world into Your net. O Loving One, glory be to You.

#### **Kontakion (Plagal Tone Four)**

When the Most High came down and confounded tongues of men at Babel, He divided the nations. When He dispensed the tongues of fire, He called all to unity, and with one voice we glorify the Most Holy Spirit.


