
(Apolytikion of the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross)

My beloved parishioners,

By the Grace of God, we have entered the month of September. I truly pray that you had a restful and rejuvenating summer, and you are ready to return "full force" to our Church and community life.

September marks the beginning of the new ecclesiastical year and the commencement of all parish activities. It also has two major feasts of our Church: the Nativity of the Theotokos and ever-virgin Mary on September 8th and the Exaltation (or Elevation) of the precious and Life-giving Cross on September 14th.

The Nativity of the Theotokos comes at the beginning of the new year as a reminder that Panagia is the source of life. The All-Holy Theotokos comes to this world and becomes the vessel and the ladder that God the Father did use to send His only begotten Son into our world, to save the humankind from the bond and the slavery of the devil and bring man back to communion with Him. In other words, the Virgin Mary reunited the two worlds, Heaven and Earth, and she played the key role in our salvation. As the great liturgist of our Church, the late Fr. Alexander Schmemann, says in a sermon: "the Feast of her Nativity is a celebration of human history, a celebration of faith in man, a celebration of man. In celebrating Mary's birth, we find ourselves already on the road to Bethlehem, moving toward the joyful mystery of Mary as the Mother to God."



On the feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, we are reminded of the historic event of the finding of the Cross of Jesus Christ by Saint Helen, the mother of Saint Constantine the Great, the Emperor, in 326 A.D. We read in the history of the feast: "In the twentieth year of his reign (326), the Emperor Constantine sent his mother Saint Helen to Jerusalem to venerate the holy places and to find the site of the Holy Sepulcher and of the Cross. Relying upon the oral tradition of the faithful, Saint Helen found the precious Cross together with the crosses of the two thieves crucified with our Lord. However, Helen had no way of determining which was the Cross of Christ.

With the healing of a dying woman who touched one of the crosses, Patriarch Macarius of Jerusalem identified the True Cross of Christ. Saint Helen and her court venerated the Precious and Life-Giving Cross along with many others who came to see this great instrument of Redemption. The Patriarch mounted the ambo (pulpit) and lifted the Cross with both hands so that all of the people gathered could see it. The crowd responded with "Lord have mercy". In commemoration of this triumphant elevation of the Holy Cross, in every Orthodox Church we hold a special service on the day of the Feast. We place the Cross on a tray decorated with branches of basil and flowers and we process the Cross throughout the Church chanting the Hymn of the Feast: "Save, O Lord, Your people and bless Your inheritance...." When the priest reaches the center of the Church, he places the tray on a table, takes the Cross and offers petitions from each side of the table, the four directions of the compass, representing the universal offering of Christ's life upon the Cross. The faithful respond by chanting "Lord have mercy" multiple times, while the priest raises and lowers the cross,

a commemoration of its finding and exaltation. Then, the faithful venerate the cross and receive from the priest, as a blessing, the basil in commemoration of the finding of fragrant basil where the Cross of Christ was found. Also, the day of the Holy Cross is a day of strict fasting and repentance as it is equal to Holy Friday, the day that Jesus Christ died on the Cross.

From the two feasts we can receive many spiritual messages. The Feast of the Nativity of the Theotokos is the beginning of the unfolding of God's salvation plan for humanity and prepares the world for its salvation, as God Himself would come on earth and become man of the Virgin Mary, who is the "divine gate" and the true Mother of life. The event of Panagia's birth reminds us that we have a great example to follow: the humility and obedience of the Theotokos; the two virtues that brought forth the Messiah and therefore we have our Savior Jesus Christ, and that we should all become temples of Christ, the living God, exactly like Panagia did.

The Feast of the Elevation of the most precious Cross of Christ reminds us of the sacrificial life of the Lord, who was crucified on it for our salvation, thus transforming the wood of "punishment" and "shame" into the wood of life and salvation. It reminds us that Christ's Cross gives us hope, life, repentance, victory over sin, and the means to our salvation; it reminds us that without a "cross" in our lives there is no salvation; it reminds us also that our salvation does not happen in a magical and automatic way; it requires our active and conscious participation through the Church, the Sacraments and the spiritual life that we are all called to live as Orthodox Christians. Please wear a cross around your neck and have it close to your heart forever! Make the sign of the cross over yourselves constantly especially in times of need-invoking the powerful grace of the Cross of Christ!

My beloved parishioners,

We are tremendously blessed having our Church communities and parishes, where we can find Jesus Christ, worshiping Him and communing with His Holy Body and Blood and with our fellow brothers and sisters. And now that September is here and the Fall is back, we are asked to return to our Churches and participate in the life of our parishes. Here at Holy Trinity, we are commencing all of our activities, beginning with the annual "picnic" on Sunday, September 8th. Please come and also sign up your children for Sunday School, Greek School and all youth activities and ministries. The first day of Sunday School will be on Sunday, September 15th, following the Divine Liturgy, and the Greek School Agiasmos Service on Wednesday, September 18th at 5.30pm. Also, don't forget our 16th annual Golf tournament on Monday, September 23rd at the Concord Country Club in West Chester, PA.

Last but not least, mark your calendars for the forthcoming celebration of our 90th Anniversary on the weekend of November 2nd and 3rd. Please join us in honoring 90 years of life and Orthodoxy in Delaware, by attending the Anniversary Gala on Saturday and the Divine Liturgy on Sunday, with the presence of His Eminence Metropolitan Apostolos of New Jersey. In the coming days you will receive a formal invitation to the Gala. Με την Χάρη και την ευλογία της Αγίας Τριάδος υποδεχόμαστε και πάλι τον Σεπτέμβριο, τον πρώτο μήνα του Φθινοπώρου, που σηματοδοτεί την έναρξη όλων των Ενοριακών, Κοινοτικών και Νεανικών δραστηριοτήτων. Την 1η Σεπτεμβρίου εορτάζουμε την αρχή του Εκκλησιαστικού έτους και προσευχόμαστε να μας δίνει ο Θεός δύναμη στην πορεία της ζωής μας κατά την καινούρια αυτή περίοδο.

Ο μήνας Σεπτέμβοιος είναι πολύ σημαντικός γιατί εοοτάζουμε -μεταξύ άλλων- δύο πολύ μεγάλες και σπουδαίες εοοτές: την Γέννηση της Υπεραγίας Θεοτόκου στις 8 Σεπτεμβοίου και την Ύψωση του Τιμίου και Ζωοποιού Σταυρού στις 14 Σεπτεμβοίου.

Η Γέννηση της Παναγίας μας έσχεται στην ασχή του νέου έτους για να μας υπενθυμίσει ότι η Παρθένος Μαρία είναι όντως πηγή της ζωής αφού έφερε στα πανάγια σπλάχνα της τον Υιό και Λόγο του Θεού. Ως εκ τούτου, η τιμή της είναι τόσο μεγάλη από τον Θεό, που κατέχει «τα δευτερεία της Τριάδος ως η μετά Θεόν η Θεός» αφού Εκείνη έγινε η Πύλη δια της οποίας ήλθε ο Θεός στον κόσμο. Η Υπεραγία Θεοτόκος ήταν το πρόσωπο που ένωσε τον ουρανό με την γη, προσφέροντας ολόκληρο τον εαυτό της στο θέλημα του Θεού: «Σύ ό τήν γῆν καί τόν οὐρανόν γεφυρώσας τῷ άγίφ σου ὀνόματι» όπως γράφει ο Άγιος Γρηγόριος ο Θεολόγος. Επίσης, η Γέννηση της Θεοτόκου σηματοδοτεί και προμηνύει την Ανάσταση του Χριστού και όλου του ανθρωπίνου γένους όπως μας υποδεικνύει το Απολυτίκιο της εορτής: «Η γέννησίς σου Θεοτόκε, χαρὰν ἐμήνυσε πάση τῆ οικουμένη, ἐκ σοῦ γὰρ ἀνέτειλεν ὁ Ἡλιος τῆς δικαιοσύνης, Χριστὸς ὁ Θεὸς ήμῶν, καὶ λύσας τὴν κατάραν, ἔδωκε τὴν εὐλογίαν, καὶ καταργήσας τὸν θάνατον, ἐδωρήσατο ήμῖν ζωὴν τὴν αἰώνιον». Εμείς οι Χριστιανοί που εξόχως αγαπούμε και τιμούμε την Παναγία, έχουμε το τίμιο πρόσωπό της ως πρότυπο υπακοής και αγιότητος, που μας καθοδηγεί καθημερινά στην πνευματική μας ζωή και μας δείχνει τον δρόμο προς την ένωσή μας με τον Θεό.


Κατά την Εορτή του Τιμίου και Ζωοποιού Σταυρού του Κυρίου μας, τιμούμε το ιστορικό γεγονός της Ευρέσεως και Ύψώσεως Του από την Αγία Ελένη το 326μ. Χ. στα Ιεροσόλυμα, αλλά παράλληλα η Εκκλησία μας υπενθυμίζει ότι η ζωή μας είναι «σταυρική». Αυτό σημαίνει ότι εφόσον πρότυπο και οδηγός μας είναι ο Σωτήρας Χριστός, οφείλουμε να τον ακολουθήσουμε στον Σταυρό ώστε να ζήσουμε την Ανάσταση, και την πνευματική αλλά και την σωματική. Σας

παρακαλώ να έρθουμε όλοι στην Εκκλησία αυτή την ημέρα να λάβουμε την Χάρη του Σταυρού. Σας παρακαλώ να φορούμε καθημερινά όλοι στον λαιμό μας τον Σταυρό του Κυρίου, και συνεχώς να κάνουμε το σημείο του Σταυρού στο σώμα μας, και να ζητάμε την βοήθεια του Τιμίου Εύλου. Να σταυρώνουμε τα παιδιά μας, τους συζύγους μας, το σπίτι μας, όλα μας τα υπάρχοντα, και να είμαστε σίγουροι ότι ο διάβολος, που τρέμει το σημείο του Σταυρού, θα φεύγει χωρίς να μας πειράζει. Κάθε φορά λοιπόν που έχουμε πρόβλημα, στενοχώρια, άγχος, θλίψη ή αγωνία, να κάνουμε τον Σταυρό μας και με πίστη και ελπίδα να παρακαλούμε τον Θεό να μας απαλλάξει από κάθε κακό.

Αγαπητοί μου,

Μας αξιώνει και πάλι ο Θεός να επιστρέψουμε από τις διακοπές μας και την καλοκαιρινή ξεκούραση και να αρχίσουμε και πάλι τις Ενοριακές μας δραστηριότητες. Είμαστε τόσο ευλογημένοι που έχουμε την Εκκλησία μας!

Την Κυριακή 8 Σεπτεμβρίου έχουμε το ενοριακό μας «πικ-νικ», την Κυριακή 15 Σεπτεμβρίου αρχίζει το Κατηχητικό μας Σχολείο και την Τετάρτη 18 Σεπτεμβρίου αρχίζει το Ελληνικό μας Σχολείο. Παράλληλα αρχίζουν όλες οι νεανικές δραστηριότητες. Σας παρακαλώ να φέρετε τα παιδιά και τα εγγόνια σας κάθε Κυριακή στην Εκκλησία και να τα γράψετε σε όλες τις ομάδες και δραστηριότητες που προσφέρει η Ενορία μας. Εμπιστευθείτε τα



παιδιά σας στον Χριστό και την Εκκλησία Του και τα παιδιά μας θα νιώθουν ασφάλεια και ζεστασιά μέσα στην αγκαλιά του Χριστού.

ECCLESIASTICAL NEW YEAR / September 1



Reading:

For the maintenance of their armed forces, the Roman emperors decreed that their subjects in every district should be taxed every year. This same decree was reissued every fifteen years, since the Roman soldiers were obliged to serve for fifteen years. At the end of each fifteen-year period, an assessment was made of what economic changes had taken place, and a new tax was decreed, which was to be paid over the span of the fifteen years. This imperial decree, which was issued before the season of winter, was named Indictio, that is, Definiton, or Order. This name was adopted by the emperors in Constantinople also. At other times, the latter also used the term Epinemisis, that is, Distribution (Dianome). It is commonly held that Saint Constantine the Great introduced the Indiction decrees in A.D. 312, after he beheld the sign of the

Cross in heaven and vanquished Maxentius and was proclaimed Emperor in the West. Some, however (and this seems more likely), ascribe the institution of the Indiction to Augustus Caesar, three years before the birth of Christ. Those who hold this view offer as proof the papal bull issued in A.D. 781 which is dated thus: Anno IV, Indictionis LIII -that is, the fourth year of the fifty-third Indiction. From this, we can deduce the aforementioned year (3 B.C.) by multiplying the fifty-two complete Indictions by the number of years in each (15), and adding the three years of the fifty-third Indiction.

There are three types of Indictions: 1) That which was introduced in the West, and which is called Imperial, or Caesarean, or Constantinian, and which begins on the 24th of September; 2) The so-called Papal Indiction, which begins on the 1st of January; and 3) The Constantinopolitan, which was adopted by the Patriarchs of that city after the fall of the Eastern Empire in 1453. This Indiction is indicated in their own hand on the decrees they issue, without the numeration of the fifteen years. This Indiction begins on the 1st of September and is observed with special ceremony in the Church. Since the completion of each year takes place, as it were, with the harvest and gathering of the crops into storehouses, and we begin anew from henceforth the sowing of seed in the earth for the production of future crops, September is considered the beginning of the New Year. The Church also keeps festival this day, beseeching God for fair weather, seasonable rains, and an abundance of the fruits of the earth. The Holy Scriptures (Lev. 23:24-5 and Num. 29:1-2) also testify that the people of Israel celebrated the feast of the Blowing of the Trumpets on this day, offering hymns of thanksgiving. In addition to all the aforesaid, on this feast we also commemorate our Saviour's entry into the synagogue in Nazareth, where He was given the book of the Prophet Esaias to read, and He opened it and found the place where it is written, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me, for which cause He hath anointed Me..." (Luke 4:16-30).

It should be noted that to the present day, the Church has always celebrated the beginning of the New Year on September 1. This was the custom in Constantinople until its fall in 1453 and in Russia until the reign of Peter I. September 1 is still festively celebrated as the New Year at the Patriarchate of Constantinople; among the Jews also the New Year, although reckoned according to a moveable calendar, usually falls in September. The service of the Menaion for January 1 is for our Lord's Circumcision and for the memorial of Saint Basil the Great, without any mention of its being the beginning of a new year.

Creator of the universe, setting times and seasons by Your sole authority, bless the cycle of the year of Your grace, O Lord, guarding our rulers and Your nation in peace, at the intercession of the Theotokos, and save us.

Kontakion in the Fourth Tone

You who created all things in Your infinite wisdom, and set the times by Your own authority, grant Your Christian people victories. Blessing our comings and goings throughout this year, guide our works according to Your divine will.

Apolytikion in the Fourth Tone


Your birth, O Theotokos, brought joy to the whole world, for from you dawned the sun of righteousness, Christ our God. Freeing us from the curse, He gave us His blessings. Abolishing death, He granted us eternal life.

Kontakion in the Fourth Tone

In your holy birth, Immaculate One, Joachim and Anna were rid of the shame of childlessness; Adam and Eve of the corruption of death. And so your people, free of the guilt of their sins, celebrate crying: "The barren one gives birth to the Theotokos, who nourishes our life."

Reading:

According to the ancient tradition of the Church, the Theotokos was born of barren and aged parents, Joachim and Anna, about the year 16 or 17 before the birth of Christ. Joachim was descended from the royal line of David, of the tribe of Judah. Anna was of the priestly tribe of Levi, a daughter of the priest Matthan and Mary, his wife.

Lifted up on the Cross by Your free will, Christ God, grant mercies to the new commonwealth that bears Your name. Gladden our faithful rulers by Your power, giving them victories over their adversaries. May Your alliance be for them a weapon for peace, an invincible standard.

Reading:

Saint Helen, the mother of Saint Constantine the Great, when she was already advanced in years, undertook, in her great piety, the hardships of a journey to Jerusalem in search of the cross, about the year 325. A temple to Aphrodite had been raised up by the Emperor Hadrian upon Golgotha, to defile and cover with oblivion the place where the saving Passion had been suffered. The venerable Helen had the statue of Aphrodite destroyed, and the earth removed, revealing the Tomb of our Lord, and three crosses. Of these, it was believed that one must be that of our Lord, the other two of the thieves crucified with Him; but Saint Helen was at a loss which one might be the Wood of our salvation. At the inspiration of Saint Macarius, Archbishop of Jerusalem, a lady of Jerusalem, who was already at the point of death from a certain disease, was brought to touch the crosses, and as soon as she came near to the Cross of our Lord, she was made perfectly whole. Consequently, the precious Cross was lifted on high by Archbishop Macarius of Jerusalem; as he stood on the ambo, and when the people beheld it, they cried out, "Lord have mercy." It should be noted that after its discovery, a portion of the venerable Cross was taken to Constantinople as a blessing. The rest was left in Jerusalem in the magnificent church built by Saint Helen, until the year 614. At that time, the Persians plundered Palestine and took the Cross to their own country (see Jan. 22, Saint Anastasius the Persian). Late, in the year 628, Emperor Heraclius set out on a military campaign, retrieved the Cross, and after bringing it to Constantinople, himself escorted it back to Jerusalem, where he restored it to its place.

Christopher C. King is an ethnomusicologist, writer, producer, and museum consultant. In 2002 he won a Grammy Award in the Best Historical Album category and has been nominated seven times. Έλληνες Μετασναστες στην Αμερική

Αλήθεια πόσο γρήγορα αλλάζει η γνώμη μας για άλλους λαούς και ομάδες στις ΗΠΑ; Πως έβλεπαν τους Έλληνες πριν 100 χρόνια και πως τους βλέπουν σήμερα; Αφορμή για το παρόν άρθρο μου έδωσε η γνώμη συναδέλφου στην εργασία μου ότι δεν είμαι λευκός. Δεν εννοούσε τίποτα υποτιμητικό, απλά δεν εγνώριζε ότι οι Έλληνες ανήκουν στην λευκή ή Καυκασία ομάδα ανθρώπων. Πίστευε ότι στην λευκή φυλή ανήκουν μόνο οι Αμερικάνοι βορειοευρωπαϊκής καταγωγής.

Στα τέλη του 19^{ou} και στα πρώτα χρόνια του 20^{ou} αιώνα, οι Έλληνες δεν κατατάσσονταν στους «λευκούς»! Θεωρούνταν, όπως προκύπτει απ' τα δημοσιεύματα και τις μαρτυρίες της περιόδου Ανατολίτες και μη Ευρωπαίοι. Αυτό μη μας εκπλήσσει διότι την ίδια αντιμετώπιση επιφύλασσαν οι Αμερικάνοι για όλους τους νοτισευρωπαίους, Ιταλούς και Ισπανούς. Η γνώμη αυτή ίσως να προήλθε από το γεγονός ότι είμαστε μελαχρινοί ή από το γεγονός ότι οι πρώτοι Έλληνες μετανάστες ήταν αμόρφωτοι και δεν μιλούσαν Αγγλικά. Ακόμη μερικοί πίστευαν ότι δεν ήμασταν Χριστιανοί, μιας και δεν ήμασταν Προτεστάντες. Μετά το Έπος του 40, με πολύ λίγες εξαιρέσεις όλοι γνωρίζουν ότι ανήκουμε και εμείς στην λευκή φυλή και ότι στην πλειοψηφία μας είμαστε Ορθόδοξοι Χριστιανοί. Η Καινή Διαθήκη και η Μετάφραση των Εβδομήκοντα Παλαιάς Διαθήκης είναι γραμμένη στην γλώσσα των θεών, Ελληνική.

Ανήκουμε στην Ινδοευρωπαϊκή ομάδα, όπως οι Ιταλοί, οι Ισπανοί, οι Πορτογάλοι, οι Σκανδιναβοί, οι Γερμανοί, οι Βρεττανοί, οι Ιρλανδοί, οι Γάλλοι· όπως και οι Σέρβοι, οι Βούλγαροι, οι Ρουμάνοι και οι Αλβανοί, οι Ρώσοι, Τσέχοι, Πολωνοί, οι Αρμένιοι οι Πέρσες, οι Ινδοί και οι Κούρδοι στην Ασία. Οι επιστημονικές έρευνες απόδειξαν ότι κοιτίδα των Ινδοευρωπαίων ήταν οι στέπες της Ευρασίας. Νεότερες έρευνες τους τοποθετούν κάπου στην Ευρώπη, όχι όμως στην Νότια Ευρώπη.

Ινδοευρωπαϊκή φυλή είναι γενικός όρος, που χαρακτηρίζει τους λαούς που ανήκουν στην Ινδοευρωπαϊκή ή άρια γλωσσική ομάδα. Οι Ινδοευρωπαίοι δεν είναι φυλή απόλυτα εξακριβωμένη ανθρωπολογικά. Αποτελούν τη σπουδαιότερη ομοεθνία, που περιλαμβάνει τους περισσότερο αναπτυγμένους λαούς. Πολύ πιθανό η αρχική κοιτίδα των Ινδοευρωπαίων να ήταν η Δυτική Ασία, ανάμεσα στον Εύξεινο Πόντο, την ανατολική Περσία και τη κεντρική Ασία. Απ' εκεί χωρίστηκαν σε δυο ρεύματα. Το ένα προχώρησε προς τη Ινδία και το δεύτερο εγκαταστάθηκε σε όλη την σύγχρονη Ευρώπη.

Η γλωσσική συγγένεια και η συγγένεια των πολιτισμών αποδεικνύει την κοινή καταγωγή των Ευρωπαίων, που γίνεται φανερή μέχρι σήμερα κυρίως στις γεωργικές περιοχές, που είναι οι συντηρητικότερες. Η Ελληνική γλώσσα περιλαμβάνει την Μυκηναϊκή, Ιωνική, Δωρική, Αττική διάλεκτο και την πρωτοελληνική γλώσσα των Πελασγών, είναι η βάση των Ευρωπαϊκών γλώσσών.

Hellene (Greek) Immigrants in America

Have we ever thought for a moment how quickly our opinion changes about other peoples and groups in the U.S.? How were the Hellenes (Greeks) perceived 100 years ago and how they we perceived today? The reason for this article it was the opinion of a colleague of mine at work that I am not white. She did not mean anything derogatory; she just did not know that the Hellenes belong to the white (Caucasian) group of people, the white race that is. She believed that only Americans of northern European descent belong to the white race are only. I had to explain to her the facts.

At the end of the 19th and the first years of the 20th century, the Hellenes are not classified as "white"! They were considered, as appears from the publications and testimonies of the period, Orientals and non-Europeans.

This should not surprising us because the Americans considered not-white all Southern Europeans, Italians and Spaniards. This opinion may have come from the fact that we are a darker-skin people compared to north Europeans, or by the fact that the first Greek immigrants were illiterate and did not speak English. Even some believed that we were not Christians, because we were not Protestants. However, after the Epic of 40 (OXI DAY), with very few exceptions, all American compatriots know that we belong to the white race and that the vast majority of us are Orthodox Christians.

The New Testament and the Septuagint Translation of the Old Testament are written in the language of the gods, the Greek, the feeder of all European languages.


We belong to the Indo-European group like the Italians, Spaniards, Portuguese, Scandinavians, Germans, British, Irish, and French; like the Serbs, Bulgarians, Romanians and Albanians, Russians, Czechs, Poles, the Armenians, the Persians, the Indians, and the Kurds in Asia. Scientific research shows that cradle of Indo-Europeans were the steppes of Eurasia. Newer studies place them somewhere in Europe, but not in southern Europe. Indo-European race is a general term, that characterizes the peoples who belong to the Arvan or Indo-European language group. Indoare not a completely anthropologically Europeans ascertained race. They make up the greatest groups of people, which include most of the developed nations. Very likely the original birthplace of Indo-Europeans was the West Asia, between the Black Sea, the eastern Persia and Central Asia. From there, they divided into two streams. One group settled in India and the second settled in contemporary Europe.

The linguistic affinity and the affinity of cultures demonstrate the common origin of Europeans, which is more evident mainly in rural areas, which are the most conservatives. The Hellenic language, includes Mycenaean, Ionic, Doric, Attic dialects and the Proto-Hellenic language of the Pelasgians, is one of the bases of all European languages.

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
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
